**QUESTIONABLE METHODS**

**A** MOST active campaign has developed in the interest of the passage of the new Sanderson charter, which is to be voted on tomorrow by the people of Klamath Falls. Between twenty and thirty men have been scouring the city and making a canvas in favor of the new charter. Practically none of these men are property owners or taxpayers, and just what their interest might be can not be ascertained. It is quite generally reported on the streets that these men are receiving pay for their work, and if this is true it should set the people of this city to thinking. Who is it that is so interested in the success of the Sanderson charter that they can pay men to work in its support, and if the charter carries how do they hope to get back these thousands of dollars being expended?

It is also reported that if the charter carries certain people will spend \$200,000 or so here this year in improvements. We do not know the source of this report, or whether it is inspired or not, but an assertion of this kind is silly, to say the least. Unless the property itself justifies the expenditure of large sums of money these improvements will not be made. If it does then the money will be spent irrespective of the failure of any charter.

Another argument being made is that should the charter be defeated it will be impossible to make any improvements on the streets this year. This is nothing less than deliberate falsifying of the facts. It is time the people of this city got wise to themselves and began to realize how they are being duped. The sewer work remaining to be done is only a small part of the improvements that might be made. Why have no steps been taken for the paving of the streets which have been petitioned for by the property owners? There is no good reason why 200 or more men should not now be working on street pavements and producing a pay roll for the city. There is no limit under the present charter for paving bonds. The question of the legality of the charter has not affected the sale of improvement bonds, and in view of the fact that the property owners of Oak street and other sections of the city are clamoring for street paving and are willing to pay the cost, we would ask why has the work been delayed until after the charter election?

There is no one holding up the development work in Klamath Falls except the present city administration, which is asking the adoption of the new charter. By waiting until after election before passing the necessary ordinances and taking the necessary preliminary steps for the improvement of these streets, it will mean that no work can be actually under way until late in the fall. Who is responsible for this condition? The people should consider this matter carefully, and then see if it is not the administration, itself, that is retarding, for a purpose, the necessary improvement of the city, and the employment of men who are sadly in need of work. Think it over, Mr. Voter, and see if you will be benefited by the new charter.

There still remains a balance of \$55,000 under the present bond limit that could be used for the completion of a sewer system. Why has no attempt been made to put in this system or dispose of bonds for that purpose?

The epidemic originated, she said, among the steerage passengers, and spread throughout when the boat docked. There were over fifty cases aboard, she declared.

**DEVELOPMENT CONGRESS**  
**TO BE MONSTER AFFAIR**

Over 1,000 Delegates Have Been Appointed by Commercial Organizations to Attend Meeting Six Weeks Hence

PORTLAND, April 22.—While it is six weeks before the Northwestern Development Congress will open at Seattle, more than 1,200 delegates have been appointed by commercial organizations and their names reported to the headquarters of the league at St. Paul. As many more have been named by governors of the seven Northwestern states. The congress opens June 5th, and closes June 8th. Its purpose is to devise means to carry the message of opportunities of the American Northwest to human millions everywhere and to make into national knowledge the facts concerning the best section on the map of the world for a home.

Seattle is making great preparations to entertain the visitors and delegates. Besides the governors of Minnesota, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, North Dakota, Montana and South Dakota, several speakers of national prominence will be present. Addresses will be delivered by Walter Fisher, secretary of the interior, and James J. Hill, Lewis Penwell, president of the Northwestern Development League, has just issued the official call for the Seattle congress.

In his call President Penwell calls attention to the fact that the Seattle congress will be the annual meeting of the organization. The league was organized a little more than a year ago to carry on a systematic campaign to assist in the more rapid development of the American Northwest.

"The congress is to strengthen the organization and approve plans for work to be outlined by these business men who have given a year to studying the needs of the territory and ascertaining the service which such an organization can perform for the seven states," says the official call. Continuing, the call says: "Speakers of national prominence, authorities on their subjects, will make the program interesting. It will be an inspiration to everyone attending and intensifying their confidence in and their love for the American Northwest."

The call directs the attention of all classes of people in the Northwest to the importance of the Seattle congress.
