WILL COUNT VOTE
OF LATE PRIMARY

COUNTY CLERK CHARLES R. DE LAP AND JUSTICES OF THE PEACE HESSIG AND HAMAKER TO AUDIT BALLOTS

Counting the votes of the county primary election Friday will be the order of things tomorrow at the court house. County Clerk Charles R. De Lap has decided on J. H. Hessig of Fort Klamath and J. O. Hamaker of Bonanza to assist him, and these three gentlemen, constituting a counting board, will be kept busy probably all day and part of tomorrow evening, seeing just how many votes the successful candidates got, which will also be the exact number that the failing candidates did not get.

The law provides that the county clerk and two justices of the peace shall constitute the board to audit the returns, so that the full quota of men necessary to tally the ballots has been obtained by the county clerk.

Mr. De Lap said this morning that he believed the count could be completed tomorrow evening, if all the ballots boxes were in by that time. Of the various precincts in the county only one has not yet had its ballot box reach the county clerk, that being Odell precinct. This is in the Deschutes country in the neighborhood of Crescent, and is a long distance from headquarters of the county. This box will probably be in some time today or tomorrow, but the county can go ahead in its absence without any difficulty. The only difficulty is that if the precinct returns should be withheld later than tomorrow it will interfere with the totaling of the result.

It is provided by the state law that a certified copy of the result for all save county offices shall be sent by the county clerk to the secretary of state at Salem, who in this case is W. Olcott. Another copy is to be posted in the office of the county

clerk. While it is not necessary to do so, County Clerk De Lap will, as a matter of courtesy, send a copy of the results for county offices to Secretary Olcott also, and will, as required by the statute in such cases made and provided, tack up on his office wall the results for county offices.

The result is believed to be generally known through the meager returns compiled last week, but in the case of sheriff on the democratic ticket, where Samuel L. Walker seems to be ahead of B. St. George-Bishop by about twenty votes, the difference is comparatively narrow, and might be affected by one precinct.
