MANY THINGS PROMISED

IT IS TO BE hoped, in case the new charter is adopted, that all of the things promised will be carried out. If this should happen then we can feel sure of seeing some rather lively times this summer. There will be all the sewer work, street paving opening of Second street and the million of dollars that is going to be spent in improvement by owners of private property. This should give employment to a thousand or more men.
We do not know who is responsible for the promises made on behalf of the city, but if the people want it and are willing to pay the cost, we hope that they will come true. We are anxious to see more money being spent in Klamath Falls, but we believe that as much of this money as possible should come from the outside. The little money in Klamath Falls has been spent so often that it is becoming worn out, and we should get some new money.
In order to encourage outside capital to invest here we believe that the surest way would be to place the financial condition of the city in such shape that investments here would be attractive to foreign capital. It is a difficult matter to persuade money to invest in a city that is financially bankrupt, however great its resources, and we cannot see how the credit of the city is to be re-established under the new charter, which provides for more indebtedness without increasing the revenue.
The Herald has fought for what it believes to be right, and if it loses we do not believe that the time and effort has been wasted. There has been more interest taken in today's election than in any election for some time, and that is the main thing to be secured. The more interest taken in public affairs the less should there be occasion for complaint at the result.

ARE FLOODS INCREASING?
THE present disastrous floods of the Mississippi River and the inundation of the surrounding lowlands through the breaking of levees suggests the inquiry: Are floods increasing in the United States?
Present conditions are admittedly most unusual, floods of both the Ohio and Missouri Rivers swelling the already heavy flow of the Mississippi itself, and this has created what will probably pass down in history as the worst flood of the Mississippi since the settlement of the country.
Precipitation—either snow or rain—must ultimately take two courses, either along the surface of the ground directly into water courses, or into the ground by percolation, with subsequent discharge into the rivers by seepage. The water which causes floods is that part of the precipitation which is not absorbed by the ground, and which, therefore, must flow along the earth's surface.
According to M. O. Leighton, chief hydrographer of the United States geological survey, in Water Supply Paper 234, which contains papers of the conservation of water resources, "there are five classes of agencies or conditions affecting the flow of streams. The first is climate, under which are comprised rainfall, evaporation, temperature, wind and humidity. Although these are exceedingly variable from day to day and from season to season the observations that have been recorded indicate that a period of years embraces all conditions, so that the mean of them may be considered fairly constant. There is very little evidence, except in special areas, that reveals any progressive and permanent change in climatic conditions. The second agency is topography, and the third geology, both of which may be considered absolutely stable. The fourth is surface vegetation, which includes forest cover and cultivated land. The fifth consists of artificial agencies, such as storage reservoirs and drainage, which produce rapid and marked effects on river discharge. "When the physical conditions on the drainage areas are summed up, the one great change that has been produced in the vegetative condition is the reduction of forest area. On some of these drainage areas it has occurred by slow progression and on

others more rapidly. It is certain that in some areas this forest cutting has caused barren conditions because the land was of such a character that after it was relieved of forest protection it eroded easily, and its productive portions were quickly swept into water courses.
"Summarily, therefore, it may be stated with confidence that the increase in flood tendency shown so unmistakably is due in by far the largest measure to the denudation of forest areas."

CATTLE BURNED; HAYSTACKS LOST

FIRES IN THE TULE SPREAD THROUGH AGENCY OF STRONG WIND, AND RANCHERS FINALLY SUBDUED WITH RAIN'S HELP

The Lakeview Herald has the following:
"The fires in the tules of the ZX swamp got beyond control April 9th, and did much damage. A strong wind sprang up from the southwest and fanned the embers into a mighty blaze which swept across the marsh with the speed of a prairie fire. Five haystacks have been consumed, one of them belonging to Geo. M. Jones, the remainder to the ZX ranch. Nearly a hundred head of cattle were cremated during the night, they having been cut off by the flames. The poor animals milled around until they succumbed to the smoke and flames. The ZX employes and ranchers from the neighborhood were out until midnight, fighting the fires, which they finally subdued with the assistance of a shower of rain, which fell about that time. This is an exceedingly heavy loss, probably in the neighborhood of \$5,000.
"The burning of tules is very risky when the fire gets on to dry ground, for it burns underneath, and may break out at a point where it is least expected. A breath of wind may fan a blazing tule root a distance of a hundred yards, and start a fresh conflagration. Sometimes only a flood of water will completely extinguish the smouldering fire."
