In the time of the Caesars it was said that all roads led to Rome. Today it may be said that all GOOD roads lead to progressive, prosperous towns.

The public highways are the arteries of trade, and no town that desires to grow and prosper can afford to neglect its country roads. The building and maintenance of improved highways is one of the most important things to be considered in the upbuilding of the country town. Not only this, but it is one of the great economic issues confronting the American farmer and producer. Careful estimates of the loss of time, labor and actual expense in the marketing of the country's enormous farm products show that bad roads impose a burden of at least \$125,000,000, the difference between the cost of hauling these products over dirt roads, which constitute 93 per cent of the total road mileage of our country, and the cost of hauling the same quantity over improved roads. This loss falls mainly on the farmer, but it also imposes the burden of higher prices on the general public that consumes the products of the farm. Thus it is clear to the average mind that one reason for the present high cost of living is attributable to bad roads.

BURN SLASHINGS EARLY IS FORESTER'S ADVICE

AN Timber Owners Urged to Have Inflammable Material Destroyed Before Dry Season to Reduce Fire Hazard

SALMON, April 20.—F. A. Elliott, state forester, has issued a letter to all timber owners urging them to burn their slashings before the dry season arrives. He says:

"Plans were made by many loggers, lumber companies and others owning land covered with inflammable material, for the burning of their slashings during the fall of 1911, but continued rains during the fall months made it impossible in the majority of cases to carry out this work. In order to reduce the fire hazard during the coming season it is therefore of the greatest importance that all persons or companies having slashings on their holdings make arrangements to burn this material during periods of favorable weather between now and the commencement of the extremely dry season. If this work receives the attention it should, hundreds of dangerous slashings can be burned without risk to green timber, and we can enter the fire season with one of our greatest dangers removed. Permits from state fire warden must be obtained for all burning done after June 1st. However, I cannot urge too strongly that you arrange for the burning of your slashings before this date, providing weather conditions are favorable."
