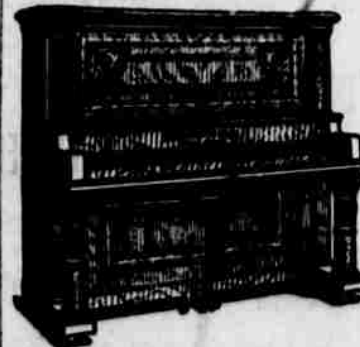

ALCOHOL AND INSANITY

WHILE in almost every part of
the civilized world alarm is
felt at the increasing ratio of insanity
in the population, there are some
localities which seem, on the other
hand, to be becoming less infested, so
to speak, with the virus of mental dis-
ease. One of these appears to be the
state of Kansas, which had in 1904,
56.3 commitments to its asylums per
hundred thousand of population. In
1910 the number for each hundred
thousand had fallen to 42.3, and in
1911 to 38.3, and the members of the
state board of control and the asylum
officials are said to credit this to the
stricter enforcement of the prohibi-
tion laws of the state and the consequ-
ent diminished consumption of al-
cohol. Of course there must be some
leakage over the border, but it seems
to be a fact that Kansas is practically
a "dry" state. The Journal of the
American Medical Association says
that it is not surprising that insanity
should decrease with the diminished
consumption of an article which is
credited by alienists with the direct
causation of at least 10 and probably
a considerable higher per cent of ex-
isting insanity, and which is a more
or less important factor in a very
much larger percentage of cases. The
Kansas figures come reasonably close
to those of the expert statistician.

**CAMPANILE DEDICATED
POPE PIUS LISTENING**

Hears Celebration Over Specially Pro-
vided Long Distance Telephone
While Sitting in Vatican—His In-
terest Plainly Shown

ROME, April 26.—While the for-
mal dedication of the new campanile,
or bell tower, of St. Mark's cathedral
was in progress at Venice yesterday
Pope Pius sat in his private apart-
ments in the Vatican, and over a spe-
cially provided long distance tele-
phone heard the speeches, ringing of
bells, firing of salutes and cheering of
the crowds.

At the program's close, declare in-
timates of the Vatican, Pope Pius de-
clared it had been the happiest hour
of his life since he became the "Vat-
ican prisoner," nine years ago. It
was the nearest fulfillment he could
picture of his desire to return to
Venice, which he has constantly ex-
pressed since his election as pope, and
the intensity of which seemingly
culminated during his illness last
summer, when he declared he would
give two years of his life if he could
be present at the campanile ceremony
which took place yesterday in Venice.

His holiness' interest culminated
when the telephone transmitted to his
ear the ringing out of the new bells
on the campanile. He cried out with
all the joyousness of a boy:
"I can hear the 'Marangona.' I
can tell it among all the rest."
The "Marangona" is the bell which
Pope Pius himself presented to the
new campanile. Originally it was one
of a set of five bells which as Patri-
arch of Venice he had presented to
the campanile years ago. When in
1902 the bell tower collapsed all of
the five bells were broken save the
"Marangona." When Pope Pius, still
as Patriarch of Venice, laid the cor-
ner stone of the new campanile, he
again presented this bell to the city,
and it was installed with the new
bells of the campanile that rang out
for the first time yesterday.

Today, by fast express train, there
will arrive in Rome a phonographic
disc that recorded at Venice yester-
day the first ringing of the bells. It
will be kept in the pope's private
library, to be used whenever he is
homesick for Venice, where he was
patriarch for nine years.
