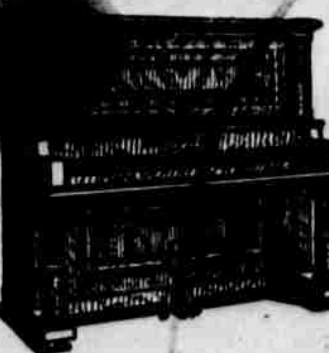

RESORT TO BOSS TACTICS

THE old caucus system, which sev-
 eral years ago was discarded by
 the overwhelming vote of every hon-
 est man in the state of Oregon, was
 resorted to last evening in an effort
 to create sentiment in favor of the
 reelection of Mayor Sanderson. A se-
 cret meeting was held, which the pub-
 lic was told was a meeting of busi-
 ness men, and an attempt was made
 to name a ticket in violation of the
 direct primary law, as well as the in-
 tent of the present charter.

It is hard for politicians to break
 away from the tricks and advantages
 of the old caucus system, where the
 boss can work his graft to the great
 disadvantage of the voter, but nothing
 could have been that would have so
 aroused the people of the city to
 the methods being used by the pre-
 sent head of the city administration as
 the so-called business men's meeting
 last night.

The meeting had been arranged in
 secret, and only a few of the select
 were notified, and yet those respon-
 sible for the meeting miscalculated on
 the strong sentiment of friendship for
 Mr. Nicholas, for when his name was
 presented in opposition to Sanderson,
 he came near carrying the assem-
 blage. If Mr. Sanderson cannot pick
 his own men and get no more votes
 than he did last night, we do not see
 how he expects to ever get elected.

Last night's fiasco was a plain at-
 tempt to secure the support of the
 other candidates and their friends for
 Mr. Sanderson. Captain Siemens is
 the logical candidate for city treas-
 urer. His long experience in this
 office and his thorough reliability
 makes him a strong man on any tick-
 et, and if Mr. Sanderson could secure
 the votes of the legion of friends of
 Captain Siemens, he would be sure of
 election.

This is also true of A. L. Leavitt
 for police judge. He is one of the
 few men thoroughly qualified for this
 important office, and there is very
 little question of his election.

As to the candidates for council-
 men, their selection should be left en-
 tirely to the voters of the several
 wards, and any attempt by a handful
 of men to dictate who the candidates
 shall be in wards other than those
 they reside and vote in, will be re-
 sented by the citizens of those wards.
 The meeting was a farce, but it had
 entirely a different effect than the
 promoters had planned. Instead of
 working to the advantage of Mr. San-
 derson, it has had just the opposite
 result. Every freedom loving citizen
 of Klamath Falls has been aroused,
 and they will demonstrate at the polls
 whether the free voters of this city
 are going to rule or whether they will
 continue to be handled, like puppets,
 by one man.

**TITANIC WITNESS GONE
 FROM MARSHALL'S KEEP**

Sailor Who Made Startling Charges
 That Lookout Was Asleep and the
 Crew Drunk. Disappears Com-
 pletely

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 27.—
 Police are searching Washington for
 Louis Klein, a sailor brought here
 from Cleveland as an important wit-
 ness at the senate investigation of the
 Titanic wreck. Klein is one of the
 Titanic survivors, and made startling
 charges that the lookout was asleep
 and members of the crew were drunk
 when the liner struck the iceberg. He
 disappeared from a hotel here, where
 he had been taken by the marshal.

Members of the senate committee
 ridicule the idea that Klein was paid
 to leave town.

**ITALY AND RUSSIA MAY
 CUT UP TERRITORY**

Understanding Between Two Nations
 Believed to Exist, Judging by the
 Movements of Respective Forces
 of War

ST. PETERSBURG, April 27.—
 With the Italian forces moving upon
 the Ottoman empire and occupying
 islands about the Dardanelles at the
 same time when Russia's Black Sea
 fleet is making its demonstration and
 Russian troops are being concentra-
 ted on the Russo-Turkish frontier near
 Urumiah, but little doubt exists here
 that an understanding has been
 reached between the two powers.

The Turkish army facing the Rus-
 sians in the east consists of 15,000
 men, all well armed and provisioned.
 It is thought that the want of an en-
 trance to the Bosphorus may precipi-
 tate a Russo-Turkish clash at Uru-
 miah.

**CHARGE OF LIBEL MADE
 AGAINST BIG PUBLISHER**

Former Secretary to Los Angeles
 Mayor Enters Suit Against General
 Otis and Two of His Aides Editorial
 Published in the Times

LOS ANGELES, April 27.—A
 charge of criminal libel, sworn to by
 Frank G. Henderson, former secre-
 tary to Mayor George Alexander, and
 a member of the public service com-
 mission, is pending against General
 Harrison Gray Otis, General Manager
 Harry Chandler and Managing Editor
 Harry Andrews of the Los Angeles
 Times.

The basis of the action is an editor-
 ial published recently in the Times,
 following Henderson's appointment
 by the mayor to the public service
 commission. The defendants will ap-
 pear in court to plead Monday.

**WU FEARS ASSASSINS MAY
 SEEK TO PUT HIM AWAY**

Manchus Some Time Ago Offered a
 Reward for His Assassination, and
 He Believes Native Country Unsafe
 for Him

SHANGHAI, April 27.—Fear of
 assassination by the Manchus, it was
 learned here, was the reason which
 caused Dr. Wu Ting Fang, who has
 been reappointed Chinese minister to
 the United States, to seek a foreign
 post.

Dr. Wu, say friends in closest
 touch with him, has never fully re-
 covered from the shock he received
 upon learning that the Manchus had
 offered a reward for his assassination,
 and still believes that China is un-
 safe for him. He was certainly slated
 for the ministry of justice, but said
 he liked the diplomatic service better,
 expressing a preference for the United
 States.
