NEEDED NOT TITANIC'S SIGNALS OF DISTRESS

Man on Californian Testifies That Vessel Saw Lights of Vessel Speeding, and That Humongous for Succor Were Ignored

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 27.—Earnest Gill, a donkeyman aboard the Californian, testified that the officers of that vessel ignored the Titanic's distress rockets.
He said: Sunday night at 11:55 the Californian was drifting in the ice field, her engines stopped. We saw lights of a big vessel going at full speed to starboard, ten miles away, and in half an hour saw one white rocket, then another. The officers couldn't have helped seeing it."
He said that he was ordered out at 6:46 Monday morning, finding the Californian steaming at top speed toward the Titanic. He heard the Californian's engineers and crew afterward tell of seeing the rockets and Morse distress signals.
He heard one say: "Why didn't they wake the wireless man?" The entire crew discussed the conduct of the captain in not going to the rescue.
Seaman John Huley, Quartermaster Rowe and Seaman John Osman of the Titanic partially corroborated Gill in their testimony. Captain Lord and Wireless Operator Evans of the Californian, denied the story.
Senator Smith privately examined F. O. Evans, a Titanic sailor. He testified that a lifeboat was swung three feet from the deck before the women were told to get in. Many jumped over the space between the deck and the boat, seventy feet above water. Others refused to take the risk.
Many babies and children were tossed into the boat over the rail. One woman who jumped and hit the boat almost fell overboard. She was hung head downward when her shoe was caught in an oarlock.

MILLIONS OF MUSKIES FROM IMPERIAL VALLEY

This Season, Is Prediction of Gentlemen Who Grow Succulent Cantaloupes—Feed Cars Being Assembled for Their Shipment

LOS ANGELES, April 26.—The growers of cantaloupes in the Imperial Valley, California, estimate this season's production at 50,000,000 melons. Approximately 5,500 acres have been planted this spring, the yield, under normal conditions, being computed at 50,000,000 melons, or about 1,000,000 crates or 2,600 carloads. At least 30,000 tons of ice will be required for the shipping of this fruit to the markets of the country. The Southern Pacific, which handles practically all of this crop, is already beginning to assemble its refrigerating cars in that section.
To get the melons to their various destinations in good condition necessitates considerable skill in packing the crates cantaloupes inside the cars. In addition to seeking an attractive appearance in the arrangement of the fruit in the car, which appeals to the car-buyer when he inspects it at its destination, the shipper must see to it that the crates are securely fastened to prevent them from shifting, and to see that they are loaded and packed as to allow free ventilation and refrigeration.
