TALK ABOUT LUMBER LASTING--

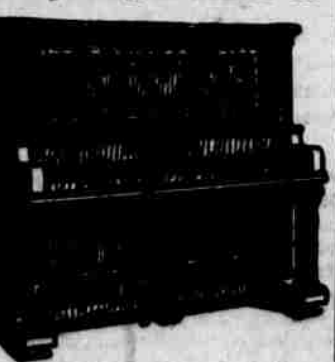
Why, it is about as durable as

FINE MUSICAL TREAT PROMISED

MRS. SUMWALT WILL PRESENT TWO MUSICAL DEBUTANTES IN VOCAL AND INSTRUMENTAL SELECTIONS FRIDAY EVENING

The variety, which is the spice of
 life, in musical as in other matters,
 is revealed in the form of the pro-
 gram to be presented by Mrs. Don
 J. Sumwalt, who offers two musical
 debutantes, sisters, and with her
 characteristic magnanimity, invites
 all lovers of those who reverse pure
 musical intonation to listen to the
 introduction of pupils who possess
 the receptiveness to imbibe the fru-
 ition of careful training that only a
 well-prepared mentor could impart.

As has been heretofore stated in
 the Herald, Mrs. Sumwalt, like all
 insistent teachers, imposes on her
 graduates-to-be a very hard program,
 but in her recent experiences it has
 been found that she knows the ca-
 pabilities and, better still, the fluent
 and elastic mental aptitude of her
 pupils.

In Mrs. Sumwalt's recital we find
 two sisters linked together. Seldom
 do we find two of such close kin
 mingling together in such happy con-
 tradiction—one, Miss Lillian Van
 Riper, at the piano, and the second,
 Miss Josephine Van Riper, whose so-
 prano voice, rich in its best melodious
 effects, has been heard with a warmth
 of delight in Klamath Falls within
 the past year.

"The Invitation to the Dance," by
 the German composer, Von Weber,
 will be the first composition, Miss
 Lillian Van Riper at the piano. As
 showing the latitude, as well as the
 longitude of Mrs. Sumwalt's selec-
 tions, what would one think of "Ara-
 gonaise from Le Cid," by Massenet,
 and "The Scarf Dance," by Chami-
 nade, intermingling themselves with
 Von Weber, chasing themselves into
 the German composer's field and re-
 surrecting the "Hunting Song" of
 Mendelssohn, intermingling it with
 his "Venetian Boat Song," which
 Chas. Warren Stoddard sang into
 what Mark Twain called perpetual
 poetic prose, then assuredly there is
 a combination of all the harmonies
 that in the last analysis, produces the
 best results and must afford the true
 exemplification of versatility of a
 singer and the true gift of her teach-
 er in cultivating a voice that is at-
 tuned to the proper chord in receiv-
 ing that education that is imparted
 to her.

With a rather mighty swing over
 the European continent, Mrs. Sum-
 walt sails for another titanic test on
 her quiescent and brilliant pupil. She
 descends the shores of the brightly
 spiced in the incandescent glory of
 the expansive streets of Berlin, and
 is not content until, after the gon-
 dolas of Venice are deserted, she
 charms a wistful audience already
 lured to poetry with "The Night Has a
 Thousand Eyes" and the unknown
 Metcalf's "Mark, as the Twilight
 Falls." Then we are to be twirled on
 "Snowflakes" and "Say Yes, Mignon."

It will be a brilliant night. No
 lover of the musical or vocalistic
 art should miss it. A brilliant so-
 prano voice will be heard.

A pianist, whose private recitals
 entitle her to the highest commenda-
 tions and warrants the conviction that
 she will measure up to their best
 judgment, is surely for the belief,
 that in the selections, Mrs. Sumwalt
 has chosen wisely and will secure the
 approbation of all on Friday night's
 generously inspirational affair.
