

PORTLAND SHOULD HAVE WOOL TRADE

TRAFFIC EXPERT CLAIMS THAT CITY CAN AND SHOULD CONTROL TRADE OF NORTHWEST IN THAT COMMODITY

PORTLAND, May 7.—Portland can control the wool trade of the Northwest because of favorable freight rates, declared William S. Smallwood, traffic expert and manager of the Chamber of Commerce transportation committee.

The business interests of Portland, he said, should lose no time in establishing a wool warehouse and preparing for the manufacture of Oregon wool into fabrics, instead of continuing to ship the bulk of it to Boston.

"It is surprising how few of our people directly interested in this industry know how the rates on wool are arrived at from points in Oregon, Washington and Idaho," said Mr. Smallwood, explaining the reasons for Portland's favorable situation.

"The all-rail rates on wool from shipping points in these states, for example, are based upon the coast (or the Portland) rate to the Atlantic seaboard, plus the local rate from Portland to the point of origin, and this basis has for years been recognized by the interstate commerce commission and reaffirmed in its recent decisions in the wool rate cases."

"I am reliably informed that close to 8,000 bales of wool were brought into this city by water from California last year for our local mills. It seems strange, with the quantity and quality of wool produced in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, enjoying the down haul water and rail rates, that this city should not control the storage and distribution of every pound of wool produced in the Northwest. There is no reason, from a transportation standpoint, why this should be the case, and it will be the case when over Portland awakens to the realization of the magnitude of the industry as it has developed in Boston, Chicago and other wool centers situated at great distances from producing centers."

"This city is splendidly situated as an entrepot for the wool clip of the entire Northwest. There is already established here thoroughly equipped livestock yards and packing houses. We have many other similar enterprises that were originally founded and which are depending for future success upon the utilization of our natural advantages."

"The wool now stored at various points in the interior awaiting sale, should be forwarded as soon as clipped to warehouses and scouring plants in this city for purchase by local buyers or mills, or for storage and future sale and shipment to the various markets of the world."

"Through this method, briefly outlined, Portland will receive substantial recognition where now she receives merely passing notice in the wool industry. It would make this city a stronger financial center, for wool is a bankable commodity the same as cotton, and when sold means cash in hand; it would help to create more steamship lines radiating from this city to all parts of the world."

"It would enable the buyers from eastern markets to come directly to this city for purchase of wool, rather than entailing the additional expense of attending numerous sales through-

and not be compelled to go into other markets for their raw materials? You must bear in mind that railroads will always share in this eastbound traffic to a large extent, for the east-bound rate to Boston from Portland is remunerative, in spite of the 10 per cent lower rate by sea."

SMELTER TRUST INVESTIGATION DEMANDED

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Searchlights of congress are now being turned upon the "smelter trust," with Representative Martin (Democrat, of Colorado) as the chief illuminator. That the investigation will spread to Colorado, Idaho, Montana, California and other mountain states is predicted by the author of the inquiry.

"The investigation will show that the trust has worked incalculable injury to western interests," Representative Martin declared. "The combine has closed smelters where they are badly needed by the miners. Moreover, it has refused to build smelters where the need was imperative. These are the least of its sins, for the throttling of the supplies of ore is complete."

"In my home city of Pueblo, Colo., the trust has closed a smelter employing 2,000 men. It has dismantled the works and a great many miners are now forced to pay extra freight charges to carry their ore to smelters miles away. In other cities the trust has not even taken the trouble to dismantle closed smelters, but left the machinery to rust into ruin."

Representative Martin says the National mining congress has endorsed his move for the investigation by passing resolutions favoring such action by congress.

Hundreds of letters have been received by the Coloradoan offering support in the inquiry. He is collecting a vast amount of data for submission to the house rules committee in support of his resolution, to induce the house to order the inquiry and summon witnesses. The American Smelting and Refining company is specifically named in the Martin resolution as constituting the alleged trust, or as an important member of the smelter combine.
