ROAST JAPAN FOR ASSISTING CHINA

Newspapers and Business Men Con-
demn the Government for Enter-
ing into "Six Powers" Syndicate
to Finance China

TOKIO, Japan, May 8.—Japanese
newspapers generally and a great
many prominent Japanese business
men and politicians are roasting the
Mikado's government for entering
into the "six powers" syndicate to
finance the new Chinese republic.

Japan's share of the loan will be
about \$50,000,000, and the govern-
ment's critics want to know where the
money is to come from. The Japan-
ese are already taxed to the extreme
limit of endurance, and it will be ut-
terly impossible for the government to
raise even a small fraction of \$50,-
000,000 on the local market. Count
Okuma says the mikado will have to
borrow the money abroad, but this
fails to satisfy the loan's opponents.
Though China will have to pay a
high rate of interest, Japan is so de-
bilitated, it is argued, that its credit
is not very good, and it will have to
pay a high rate, too. Many Japanese
doubt if their country will get out
even on the transaction, and if it
fails to do so it will be a very serious
matter, because the people are al-
ready carrying a burden almost heav-
ier than they can bear.

Count Okuma openly says that the
loan means the "six powers" intend
to "subjugate the new Chinese re-
public with money," and that Japan
simply had to enter the group to pro-
tect its own interests.

WOMEN TRIUMPH OVER OPPOSITION OF POPE

Fair Sex Will Participate, for the
First Time in the History of the
Catholic Church, in Eucharistic
Congress

ROME, May 8.—The next of the
famous eucharistic congresses of the
Catholic church, which is to be held
in Vienna September 12 to 15, is to
be made famous by the participation
for the first time in such an event of
women. This is the more remarkable
by reason of the fact that it is in di-
rect opposition to Pope Pius' fight for
years against feminism.

The pope has ever regarded the
present day tendency of women to
take an active part in public and of-
ficial life as a serious menace to re-
ligion, and his campaign against fem-
inism has been almost as vigorous
and unrelenting as have been his at-
tacks on modernism.

Nevertheless it is now not only
officially announced that the women
of the aristocracy are to play a prom-
inent part in the coming eucharistic
congress, but even the women of the
"bourgeois" class, as well. Inciden-
tally, however, in this official an-
nouncement, only the names of the
participating women of the aristoc-
racy are made public.

It is announced that the commit-
tee of women will be presided over by
the Archduchess Maria Annunziata,
and that this committee will be divid-
ed into six sections, each of which
will also be presided over by an arch-
duchess.

Archduchess Maria Guiseppa will
have the finance committee; the Arch-
duchess Bianca will look after the
finding of lodgings for the delegates;
the Archduchess Maria Teresa will
head the press agent committee; the
Archduchess Zita will have a com-
mittee in charge of the decorations,
while the Archduchess Maria Valeria
and the Duchess Hohenberg will also
be in charge of other committees.

Each of the archduchesses will be
assisted by a president, a vice presi-
dent and a council of other prominent
women of the Austrian aristocracy.
