BUILD ROAD IN REMINISCENCE

PENSIONED EMPLOYEES OF THE
SOUTHERN PACIFIC GATHER
IN ANNUAL BANQUET—AD-
DRESSES BY HIGH OFFICIALS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—The
story of the construction of the Cen-
tral Pacific railroad, now a part of
the Southern Pacific company, was
retold this afternoon at the Palace
hotel in this city, when the pensioned
employees of the Southern Pacific
gathered at their annual banquet.
The banquet this year falls upon
the forty-third anniversary of the
driving of the last spike of the first
transcontinental railroad of the
United States. Approximately half
of those now on the pension roll of
the Southern Pacific were important
factors in the construction of this
great railroad system. It is the an-
nual custom now for the road to be
built in reminiscence.

Since the inauguration of the sys-
tem on the Southern Pacific, January
1, 1903, \$1,015,014.40 has been paid
out to former employees in pensions.
The system is absolutely voluntary
on the part of the company, and 715
former employees have been awarded
pensions in those nine years. On the
first day of May, this year, there were
477 pensioners on the rolls. The pen-
sion disbursements during the month
of April, 1913, amounted to \$16-
450.35.

At the annual banquet tomorrow a
part of the entertainment will be the
exhibition of a complete set of 259
actual photographs taken during the
construction period of the Central Pa-
cific. Besides this, several of the
higher officials of the Southern Pacific
company will address the gathering.
