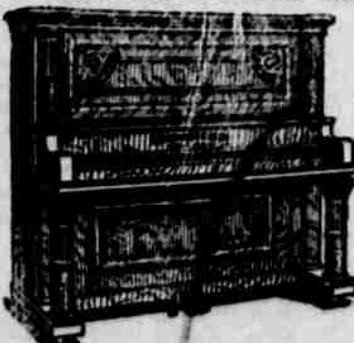

HOW TO BUILD UP YOUR HOME TOWN

Woman's Part and Interest in Civic Improvement

"In nothing, save the family alone,"
writes a woman who has taken an
active part in civic work in Wiscon-
sin, "are there greater potentialities
for a woman to cast a good spell over
life than that she help to keep the
house of her town, to bring down the
ideal village hanging above her own
village, and make her own village fit
that sweet ideal."

One of the encouraging things that
promise much for the future welfare
of American towns and cities is the
active interest that the women are
taking in the movement for civic im-
provement and home betterment. The
women's clubs and kindred organiza-
tions of women have been active
along many lines, and their work is
showing far-reaching results in num-
erous places.

Never was there a time when the
home was so dependent upon and in-
fluenced by public methods and mu-
nicipal conditions as at present, nor
when the children of our country
needed a stronger guidance and a
more far-reaching arm of protection.
Realizing this fact, and that the true
home is the only sound foundation
upon which to build an ideal society,
the women of the land have awak-
ened to their responsibility of taking
part in public affairs. So today we
find a vast army of women, busy as
bees, organized for the grand pur-
pose of improving human life, the
betterment of the home, and the up-
building and development of their
home town. The true woman and
mother has come to understand that
whatever she can do for civic and
social betterment is just that much
done for the good of her children and
the making of their life better and
more near the ideal of what she
would have it be.

A large volume could be written
about what the women's clubs have
accomplished in various parts of the
country in the past few years. A
brief reference to some of the work
done may inspire the women of other
places to take a hand in the work of
bettering their local civic conditions.

Many cities might be named where
the women's auxiliary of the Cham-
ber of Commerce or Business Men's
Club has done most effective civic
work, improving sanitary conditions
and beautifying parks, streets and
home surroundings.

A certain town in the West owned
a large tract of land that had been
set apart for a park, but had no
funds with which to improve it. The
women got busy, and organized a
park club, and started a campaign
for park improvement and a general
movement for the beautifying of
their home town. In a short time,

by various means, they raised sev-
eral thousand dollars, and got the
work started. The park tract has
been improved and beautified, and
the club is now working to secure
some smaller tracts for park pur-
poses.

The town of Enosburg Falls, Ver-
mont, had a board of trade, but it
was a mere paper organization, such
as we find in many places, and ac-
complished nothing. Then the wo-
men organized a Village Improvement
Association, and proceeded to do
things. The town was without a park
and had a general "run down" ap-
pearance. In a few years the wo-
men had raised \$12,000 for park de-
velopment and civic improvement,
and a marvelous change has been
wrought. Their work became con-
tagious. The children became inter-
ested, and all the people were awak-
ened to the needs of modern town and
village life. Today the town has very
few dirty or ill-kept backyards, the
humblest homes have a neat and tidy
appearance, and the lawn-mower is
considered a necessity.

At Birmingham, Ala., conditions
obtained that were disgraceful to the
city and shocking to the best citizens.
The Women's Civic League was or-
ganized, and soon proved that there
was a well-defined need for such an
organization. In less than a year the
league has done much to improve the
civic conditions of the city.

The Women's Civic League of
Grand Forks, N. D., by thorough or-
ganization and wise leadership, has
accomplished wonders for that town
in municipal reform and civic bet-
terment.

At Portage, Wis., the women have
accomplished much in civic work. Af-
ter the people had twice voted down
the proposition to construct sewers,
the local Woman's Club took a hand,
and the sewer bonds were voted two
to one. Then they organized an im-
provement association, and as a re-
sult of their work, such problems as
garbage disposal, clean streets and
alleys and pure milk for the town
have been solved; manual training
and domestic science have been in-
troduced in the public schools, and
much has been done for the beautify-
ing of school and home grounds.

"Start now!" would be a good
slogan to adopt where the women
have, as yet, taken no active part in
the upbuilding of their home town.
What a vast field they will find for
work to improve local conditions
along various lines, and make their
homes and towns clean and beautiful
as well as to develop the best and
highest in the social life of the com-
munity.
