TO MAKE THE HIGHEST LEAP EVER ATTEMPTED
 PORTLAND, May 21.—A dive from the top of the new steel bridge lift tower proposed by Harold L. True as a Rose Festival feature is being seriously considered by the Rose Festival management.
 The leap, if made, will be greater than ever before attempted by any man. The lift towers of the new bridge are higher than Niagara Falls. The towers, according to G. W. Boschke, chief engineer of the O. W. R. & N. company, are 175 feet above low water. At the highest point Niagara is 164 feet. This is on the American side. On the Canadian side the fall is 150 feet. True's proposition becomes at once of important scientific conjecture. Can a man leap from such a height, no matter how expertly, and live?

True avers that he can do it successfully. He says he has discovered a method of high diving which will save him from the slightest harm. Others claim that the force of the impact of his body against the water will wrest consciousness from him, and that he will never rise again until the grapplers get hold of him. True is a high diver of long experience, with many daring leaps to his credit.

KLAMATH FALLS BOY WINS FROM MULTNOMAH—HAS ALSO BEEN ACTIVE IN SCHOOL WORK AT UNIVERSITY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 21.—Vingent Yaden, a student from Klamath Falls, and a graduate of the Klamath County high school, represented the University of Oregon in the annual tennis tournament with the Multnomah Athletic Association of Portland, winning a hard fought victory over his opponents. Yaden has been a consistent player on the Varsity tennis squad, and is likely to be one of the team of three to be sent to Seattle to meet the University of Washington on Friday and Saturday, May 24 and 25. If he defeats his opponents in this contest he will be entitled to the official "C" awarded by the student body to its representatives in tennis.
 Yaden has been a versatile and active student during his two years in the university. Besides his work in athletics he has taken a lively interest in debate, and in his freshman year received the rare honor of being elected president of his class.
 His college studies have been chosen wisely, and are such as to fit a man for a useful and active life in his community. He is majoring in Economics, and besides this subject he is taking work in Sociology, Psychology, History, English, Public Speaking, etc.
