

COUNCIL WILL MEET TOMORROW

CHARTER MUDDLE IS CAUSING A GREAT DEAL OF CONFUSION, AS THERE IS SOME DOUBT OF PRESENT CHARTERS STANDING

Mayor Sanderson stated today that he would probably call a meeting of the council tomorrow night, but that it might be necessary to adjourn to a later date, in order to have time to fully investigate and determine what to do in regard to the commission amendment passed by the people.

There seems to be a question as to the legality of the submission of the present charter, which was adopted at the special election on April 23d. It is claimed that by placing it before the people before the commission charter, that the rights of the voters under the initiative and referendum was thwarted. There are many people in the city who contend that the council had no legal right to thus take advantage of the people in this manner. If the present charter has been illegally submitted, then the election of yesterday was not legal and Sanderson would still be mayor.

It looks like a bad muddle for the charter, and it probably will not be straightened out until a supreme court decision is had, or until the legality of the new charter is passed on by the attorneys of the bond buyers. The buyers who bid on the city hall bonds have already asked for the proceedings leading up to the submission and adoption of the present charter, and it may be that an opinion will be received from their attorneys.

Will View Road

County Judge W. S. Worden and Commissioner S. T. Summers went to Midland today to look over the proposed road which is to connect the southern end of the county with Klamath Falls by way of the lake shore route. This matter has been up several times before the county court by petition, but as an objection has been made by some of the property owners whose land will be traversed, the court will look into the matter to see what damage will be sustained.
