BURYING THE HATCHET

The contest for the election of city
officials is over, and the sugges-
tion that the hatchet be buried is a
good one, and we believe meets with
the approval throughout the entire
city. The victors can afford to be
generous in assisting a movement in
this direction, and those who were on
the defeated side should not permit
false pride to deter them from taking
the initiative, if necessary, in an ef-
fort to discard all personal feeling
that has for so long disrupted the
city and caused internal war and
strife.

Mayor-elect Nicholas is a man who
has been broad to permit any fac-
tions or party to interfere with the
performance of his duty. He has ac-
cepted a great responsibility, far
greater than the majority of citizens
realize, and in order to accomplish
the greatest success must have the
united support of every loyal citizen
in Klamath Falls. Under the present
condition of affairs no man, however
great, can accomplish any pronounced
results without this support.
There is no use beating around the
bush in any attempt to get together
and create harmony in the city. The
court house question must be first
settled before the entire city can be
united as a body. This fight, trivial
as its importance is, has been the
cause of greater damage to Klamath
Falls than any one thing in the history
of the city. Unless the opposing
sides are willing to compromise this
question we honestly feel that any
movement for the friendly uniting of
the factions in the city will be as un-
successful as they have been in the
past.

We believe that the most interested
men on both sides should be too big
and broad minded to permit this mat-
ter to remain longer unsettled, and
thus interfere with the growth and
prosperity of the city. Klamath Falls
is becoming too big to continue these
squabbles, and the majority of the
citizens have long ago become dis-
gusted, and they should not be cheat-
ed out of their opportunity to share
in the natural prosperity, such as
should be expected in a city with the
abundant resources and surround-
ings of Klamath Falls.
We believe the time is right for the
settlement of this question, and that
the people are in the proper mood to
get together and "bury the hatchet,"
and start the building of a newer and
better Klamath Falls.

INDUSTRIAL SURVEY OF THE ENTIRE STATE

The Statistical Bureau of O. A. C.
Sets Corps of College Men to Work
This Summer Making Survey for
Use in College Work

Special to the Herald
CORVALLIS, May 22.—This sum-
mer Dean J. A. Bexell of the school of
commerce of the Oregon Agricultural
College will have charge of an in-
dustrial survey of the state for the
Oregon statistical bureau. The pur-
pose is to collect accurate statistical
data to show the degree to which the
various counties of the state are de-
veloping their resources.

Governor West has released the ap-
propriation provided by the last leg-
islature for this work, and State Im-
migration Agent C. C. Chapman will
co-operate with the statistical bureau
in the publication in bulletin form of
the results. It is expected that the
statistics will furnish the public ac-
curate and reliable figures to correct
exaggerated statements which have
unfortunately crept into the press.

Plans for making the survey were
completed at a recent meeting of the
advisory committee on statistical re-
search, which includes representa-
tives of each industrial department
of the college, as follows:
Commerce, Dean J. A. Bexell; ex-
periment station, Dr. James Withy-
combe; school of agriculture, Dean
A. B. Cordley; school of engineering,
Dean G. A. Ceval; division of horti-
culture, Prof. C. I. Lewis; dairy hus-
bandry department, Prof. F. L. Kent;
school of mines, Prof. H. M. Parks;
forestry department, Prof. G. W.
Peavy; political economy, Prof. Hector
MacPherson; agronomy depart-
ment, Prof. H. D. Scudder.

A plan has been adopted which di-
vides the state into districts and pro-
vides for field agents to cover each
district and collect the data which
will be worked up at the college next
fall. The field agents will work un-
der the direction of Assistant Statis-
tician E. B. Lemon.

NEW BOOKLET GIVES FACTS ABOUT OREGON

PORTLAND, May 22.—To give
truthful information about the lands
of the American Northwest—Oregon,
Washington, Idaho, Montana, North
Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota—
the Northwestern Development
League has just issued an attractive
50-page booklet descriptive of the
seven states under the title of "How
and Where to Get a New Home in the
American Northwest."

Oregon is given much space in the
new booklet, and is shown to rank
third in land area and thirty-fifth in
population among the states and ter-
ritories of the United States. Other
