CAMPAIGN FOR HIGHWAY BILLS
11,000 SIGNATURES TO THE SIX HARMONY ROAD PETITIONS RECEIVED, BUT 24,000 ARE STILL LACKING
PORTLAND, May 23.—Eight counties have been heard from in the campaign for the harmony highway bills. Securing of signatures for the petitions to place the bills on the ballot at the November election were reported from Benton, Washington, Yamhill, Wasco, Clatsop, Coos, Linn and Klamath counties. The total number of signatures from the out-state counties was 2,400. At the same time 3,000 signatures were reported from Portland circulators of the petitions, making the total for the day 5,400.
"We now have in the office 41,000 signatures for the six harmony highway petitions," said President Prall of the good roads association.
"But I wish I might say or do something that would convince some dozens of good people who are interested in the better highways campaign that we still need not less than 24,000 signatures to make sure of getting the bills on the ballot."
"I met a man yesterday who had secured signatures sufficient to fill two sets of the petitions, but who had not reported them because he said he was under the impression that already 45,000 signatures had been received and more were not necessary."
"We will not have 45,000 signatures unless those who have been circulating them make their reports. I have no certainty that the signatures secured but not reported would complete the total, but I feel that if all the reports were in this would be the case."
"It is urgently necessary that the friends of the good roads movement throughout the state should increase their activity, and not be slow in making reports. Why, to my mind, the whole development future of Oregon depends upon the strength of the work done now, and there should not be any apathy or lack of definite effort."

WOOL INTERESTS GO HIGHER WITH OFFERS
PORTLAND, May 23.—Wool market conditions are improved somewhat. In their effort to hurt sales dates as much as possible, Eastern interests are offering an advance of one-half to a cent a pound over previous prices on contracts at Eastern Oregon points. Quite a fair amount of stock has been purchased by them during the past few days.
Contracting in Eastern Oregon is showing a price range from 12c to 17c a pound, both of these values being extreme. The bulk of the business passing from 14c to 15c a pound, with perhaps most of this around the latter figure.
The early approach of the regular sales dates is stimulating Eastern interests, and this is perhaps the reason why they are sending so many men into the field at this time. In the Willamette Valley increasing business is noted. Purchases are reported as high as 20c a pound for extra fine quality, but the bulk of the business is passing from 18c to 19c. Some dealers are not offering above 19c for anything, no matter how fine the quality of offerings.
Practically no change is shown in the Eastern situation.

DADDY WILEY TALKS ON CHILD RAISING
Food Expert Bars Pins, Long Dresses, Artificial Milk and Four Air—Starts Son With a Savings Bank of a Hundred Dollars
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 23.—Washington has given Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, formerly chief chemist of the department of agriculture, a new title. It is "Daddy."
"I wanted a girl," he said today, still bubbling over the addition to the Wiley household, "but Mrs. Wiley wanted a boy, and women always have their own way."
John Harvey Wiley will be reared under the direction of the greatest living authority on food hygiene. The diet upon which he will subsist and the care that will be taken of him may well serve therefore as a model for the most lucky children in the United States.
Dr. Wiley insists that the great infant mortality is directly due to ignorance as to the care that should be taken of them.
"Our child," said Dr. Wiley with great pride, "is to be a pure food and fresh air baby literally. At first he will take natural food from his mother, and it surpasses any baby food that ever has or ever will be invented."
"A child should not be weaned until it is 15 to 18 months old, and never until he has passed his second summer. Our baby will be weaned a year from the first of next September. Of course he will have some light food before that time, but only a little white of egg and gruel. After he begins to eat he will have cereals, fresh, good meats, soft boiled eggs, barley broth, starchy food in moderation and fruit juice. He will not be given fruit until after he is three years old and has all his teeth."
"If we can obtain tuberculosis germ proof, perfectly clean cow's milk, he will be allowed to drink all he can. From the very first our baby will sleep in the open air, as God intended all men to do. His little lungs will be filled with life giving ozone taken fresh from God's great out-of-doors, without being bottled in close rooms and unhealthy mansions. His clothes will be very few and very simple. I do not intend that our baby shall ever wear the trailing robes many miles too long, that torture and retard the growth of infants."
"From the first he will be free to kick his little feet and roll and tumble all he wants to. All the clothes must hang from the shoulders, of course, and that cross of childhood, pins to stick him and lacerate his tender flesh, will be conspicuously absent. When he gets a little older we will put him in rompers and sandals, so his growing feet will have a chance to retain their shape. He will be taught the virtues of cold water early in life. He is to drink lots of it, not ice water, but water of the temperature of the blood. Milk, also, should be given to children at blood temperature. One of the earliest lessons a child should be taught is thrift, and instead of John Harvey being allowed to squander his pennies, he is to be taught to save them. I started him right today," said the doctor, as he exhibited a savings bank book made out to John Harvey Wiley, with an initial deposit of \$100.
"In addition to the savings account he has two shares in a building association. That is to lead him to acquiring a few acres of land and a home of his own in the future, for the happiest man is the man who knows that he owns the land that shelters his dear ones."

OREGON SENDS ORATOR TO INTERSTATE CONTEST
EUGENE, May 23.—Carlton E. Spenser, Oregon's representative to the Interstate Oratorical Association, has left Eugene for Missoula, Mont., where he will represent the 'varsity' in the annual contest. The league is composed of the state universities of Oregon, Idaho and Montana; the Oregon Agricultural college, the Washington state college and Whitman college.
Spenser was winner of the state oratorical contest a year ago, using the subject, "The Rust on Our Legal Machinery." He will use practically the same oration this year, changing the title to "Our Broken Down Legal Machinery." The contest was won last year by Charles Robinson, an Oregon student, registering from Portland. Robinson presented a discussion of the immigration question.
