## COAST THREATENED WITH ANARCHY, SAYS MISS LAUT

Carries a Trunk Full of Literature  
Which Proves That So-Called Labor  
Organizations Are Working to  
Overthrow Existing Conditions

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 24.—  
According to Miss Agnes Laut, the  
well known magazine writer, the Pa-  
cific coast is threatened with an-  
archy. She declares a crisis is rap-  
idly approaching.

"I am not against labor organiza-  
tions," said Miss Laut. "On the con-  
trary I am in sympathy with them,  
but there are social organizations in  
British Columbia, Washington and  
California which are nothing more  
than organized anarchy, the only ob-  
ject of which is to overthrow capital  
and law and order."

Continuing on the subject, Miss  
Laut said:

"I have a trunk load of anarchist  
literature that is being disseminated  
up and down the Pacific coast by  
such powerful organizations as the In-  
dustrial Workers of the World and the  
American Federation of Labor. This  
literature boldly avows that the de-  
struction of all property rights is the  
object being worked for. I can show  
you posters which state that the aim  
of so-called labor organizations is to  
secure a three-hour day of labor. I  
pointed out the absurdity of a three-  
hour day to some of the leaders with  
whom I talked, and they said their  
object was to make labor so dear that  
capital of the world would be taken  
away from the present holders and  
transferred to them, and that their  
sole object was to overthrow capital."

Miss Laut declared that the situa-  
tion would be keenly accentuated  
with the opening of the Pan American  
canal.

## FRANCE SPREADS HER PROTECTING ? WINGS

PARIS, May 24.—The decree mak-  
ing official announcement of the taking  
over of Morocco as a protectorate by  
the French is to be made shortly.  
President Fallieres has approved the  
document, and as soon as General  
Lyautey makes his report from Fez  
on conditions there the decree will be  
promulgated. Muley-Hafid, the weak-  
ling sultan, declares he has lost all  
authority over the native troops, in-  
dicating that he cannot be held re-  
sponsible for such events as the re-  
cent massacre at Fez. He is a moral  
nonentity, and occasionally threatens  
to abdicate on the most childish pro-  
vocation. Added to this, Germany is  
known to be watching Morocco close-  
ly, and it is believed might try to  
make trouble if any of its subjects  
should be molested by natives. France  
consequently, is impressed with the  
necessity for haste in establishing the  
proposed protectorate.

## AUTOMOBILE LICENSE LAW TO BE TESTED

LA GRANDE, May 24.—J. F. Camp-  
bell and W. K. Davis of La Grande  
are today being tried in Union on the  
charge of running automobiles with-  
out having paid the state license.  
They were arrested and placed under  
\$100 bonds to appear for trial. It is  
their purpose to take the case to the  
supreme court to test the validity of  
the license law. There are many ma-  
chines in Eastern Oregon that have  
never been licensed and the city mar-  
shal of Union is the only officer in  
this section of the country who is try-  
ing to enforce the law.

## TO EXECUTE DOGS IN A NEW DEATH CHAIR

WESTFIELD, Mass., May 24.—A  
death chair for animals will be estab-  
lished by Dr. R. D. Earle, a veteri-  
nary surgeon. In electrocuting a dog  
an electrode will be placed on a  
sponge at the back of the animal's  
neck, the wire running along the spi-  
nal column to the tip of the tail. Dr.  
Earle has previously employed cyan-  
ide of potassium.

## CHINA'S NEW GOVERNMENT HAS THE USUAL TROUBLE

Too Many Public Servants With Too  
Little "Savvy" of Their Duties—  
Replacing Them With Efficient Men  
Causes Tie-Up of Business.

PEKIN, May 24.—The new gov-  
ernment is having endless trouble in  
reducing the number of employees in  
the numerous boards, departments  
and bureaus at the capital, accord-  
ing to announcements made today.  
Almost every time an order is issued

for the dismissal of a part of any par-  
ticular staff, there is a strike by the  
entire force. Vacant places are fre-  
quently filled by more efficient men,  
but the succession of shake-ups has  
resulted in a serious tie-up of public  
business, which, in the face of the  
present crisis, is a grave matter.

Ousted employees also are begin-  
ning to form a formidable class of  
malcontents.

President Yuan Shi Kai and his  
chief advisors declare their intention  
of continuing the reorganization work  
in spite of the danger.
