**CONGRESS HAS SEVERAL
LITTLE EARLY RISERS**

There are a Few Statesmen in Wash-
ington Who Turn Out Real Early
in the Morning for Work, Contrary
to General Idea of the Public.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—

Breaking all rules of congressional
decorum, congress has several "little
early risers" who are noted for ar-
riving at their offices for work from
three to five hours before congress
convenes. Their colleagues accuse
them of not "belonging to the union,"
but they persist in reporting for
work anywhere from 7:30 to 9 a. m.

Representative Norris, the republi-
can "progressive" from Nebraska,
is one of the earliest and latest work-
ers in the house. Eight o'clock is
his uniform hour for beginning work.
He grinds out his correspondence
long before many of his colleagues
are out of bed.

Representative Kendall, republican
of Iowa, is another familiar figure in
the house office building in the wee
small hours of early morning. He

breakfasts at 6 o'clock, and is always
at work before 8.

Representative A. Mitchell Palmer,
democratic "boss" of Pennsylvania,
who succeeded Colonel Guffay as na-
tional committeeman, is another early
worker. Representative Lobeck, dem-
ocrat of Nebraska, also retains his
early morning habits, brought from
Nebraska.

Chairman Henry of the house rules
committee, has a 9 o'clock rule in
his office, as has Majority Leader Os-
car Underwood. They arrive with or
before the clerks.

Speaker Clark gets to the Capitol
by 10, sometimes before.
"Billy" Kent of California, is an-
other early worker, rivaled by Judge
Raker, the lone democrat from the
Golden Gate state.

But most of the statesmen cannot
make their offices before 11 o'clock
or noon, except when committee
meetings run them out earlier. The
senators are even more prone to ob-
serve late hours than the members
of the lower body. But former Sen-
ator Kittredge of South Dakota was
a shining exception. Six o'clock was
his opening hour, and he demanded
its observance by his clerks, but he
"closed up shop" by 2 p. m.
