

FRANKLIN TESTIFIES TO BRIBERY OF BAIN

LOS ANGELES, May 29.—Detective Franklin on the stand, giving testimony in the Bain bribery charge. He testified:

"I asked Bain if he would accept \$500 with a promise of \$3,500 more when the McNamara case was closed. I gave him \$400, instructing him not to use any part of it until two months later. Bain asked me what assurance he had that he would get the rest of the money. I said that we were placed in such a position that we would have to pay."

Ford asked Franklin: "Did you report the matter to Darrow?" Franklin said: "I did, the next day."

Judge Hutton ruled the deposit slip for \$1,000 which Franklin says he received from Darrow and deposited in the bank, admissible as evidence.

The trial adjourned at noon until Friday, owing to a death in the family of Attorney Appel for the defense.
