SIXTY-FOOT PIERS IN NEW RAILROAD BRIDGE

Special to the Herald
SACRAMENTO, June 3.—Sufficient
concrete to put in a six-inch cover on
a fifty-foot street a mile long is con-
tained in just one pier of the new Sacra-
mento River bridge of the Southern
Pacific company, recently completed
and placed in operation as a part of
the double-tracking of the system.
Completed, the new bridge is 2,200
feet in length, contains 19,000 cubic
yards of concrete and 9,200,000
pounds of steel. It has the heaviest
swing span of any like structure yet
erected, weighing 6,300,000 pounds.
The upper deck has an eighteen
foot wagon road, with a five-foot side-
walk on each side. The lower deck is
to be used for the double tracks of the
Southern Pacific. The piers upon
which the bridge rests average 90 feet
in height, or about as tall as an eight
story office building, and each occu-
pies a space as large as an ordinary
city lot.
