ATTENTION TO SEED IS URGED

**GREATER YIELD IN CROPS AND A
CORRESPONDING GAIN IN IN-
COME TO FARMERS RESULT OF
MORE CARE**

PORTLAND, June 5.—The farm-
ers of Oregon must pay more atten-
tion to the selection of seed if they
would expect fine crops, declared N.
C. Maris, well known agricultural ex-
pert.

"It is as important to select good
seed for successful crops as to special-
ize in the breeding of stock for the
producing of animals," said Mr. Maris,
who as special representative of the
agricultural college has been thor-
oughly investigating crop and soil
conditions throughout Oregon.

"Many farmers have adopted im-
proved methods of preparing the soil,
but few have paid any attention to
seed selection and improvement. The
best methods are generally adopted
in caring for and handling the crop,
and the most approved machinery
used in harvesting and threshing, but
little or no attention has been paid to
the fundamental principles of select-
ing and breeding up seed for increas-
ing the quantity and quality of the
crop. Much has been done in the im-
provement of our livestock, but little
in the way of improving our farm
crops.

"What has been done in the way of
improving our different breeds of do-
mestic animals is a matter of history,
and reads like romance. The beef
steer of a few generations ago that re-
quired four or five years growth to
reach the market at 1,000 pounds,
now tips the beam at 1,100 or 1,200
at half that age. The hog of our
fathers that spent a year growing a
carcass upon which to store a few
pounds of fat during a three months
process of fattening, now grows into
a finished product in six to nine
months.

"The dairy cow that once was high-
ly respected for producing a pound of
butter a day must now make two or
three times that much to admit her
to aristocratic dairy circles. Four or
five pounds was not many years ago
considered a fair average fleece for a
flock of range sheep in this state.
Now they are expected to clip twice
that amount.

"How has all this come about? By
mere chance? No, it has been done
by breeding up, by selection, largely,
together with improved environment.
Through this work of improving the
different breeds of live stock many
men have immortalized their names
and added millions to the material
wealth of the country. What these
men have done in the animal world
Luther Burbank, the wizard of horti-
culture, has been doing in the veget-
able kingdom. Of course, we have
lesser lights in this work, but nothing
like so many as engaged in the im-
provement of live stock, and Burbank
stands alone as a star of the first
magnitude.

"He who makes two blades of grass
or two pounds of meat or two pounds
of wool grow where only one grew be-
fore is a philanthropist, and there is
room for a lot of philanthropists in
this country. You may not be a 'Lut-
her Burbank,' but there is ample op-
portunity for a lot of you to be 'little
Burbanks.'

"While livestock improvement has
been making rapid strides, little has
been done to improve our cereals and
the average yield of our country has
declined rather than increased. Not-
withstanding this fact the improve-
ment of our grain crops by selection
and breeding is just as fertile a field
of endeavor as that of livestock—just
as interesting and more easy of access
for everyone. Many cannot afford to
do much experimenting in the breed-
ing of livestock on account of the ex-
pense, but no farmer is so poor that
he cannot afford to maintain a breed-
ing plat for the improvement of his
seed grain, in fact, he cannot afford
not to do so. Every branch of phys-
ical endeavor—whether commercial,
mechanical, agricultural, or what not
has its leaders—those who do the
thinking and planning for the better-

ment of the masses. In the livestock
world the breeders of the pedigreed
strains are generally acknowledged
as leaders, improvers and benefactors.
As a breeder of registered stock is a
leader in the livestock world, so
should the thrasher be the leader in
the grain improvement.

"The stockman would be consider-
ed a back number who paid no atten-
tion to the selection of his breeding
stock. The breeder of beef cattle
would be called a fool who would
head his herd with a lank, lean bull,
out of a skinny skate of a cow. The
dairyman would not be worthy the
name who bred his cows to a bull
whose dam did not produce more than
a half pound of butter fat a day, and
the sheep man who used a bunch of
bare-bellied, light fleeced rams on
his flock would need a protective tar-
iff as high as Mount Hood in order
that he might make money producing
wool. But such practices compare
favorably with the methods of most
farmers regarding their seed of such
grain and vegetables. It is a very
common practice to save the little po-
tatoes for seed and second or third
rate grain is often sown without any
regard to what its ancestry may have
been."

mortgage, dated January 15, 1910,
and executed by each of you to said
plaintiff, upon the following described

The E 1/4 of NE 1/4, SW 1/4 of NE 1/4,
and NW 1/4 of SE 1/4, all of Section 29,
Tp. 29 S., R. 9 E., W. M., containing
160 acres, more or less.

To secure to the plaintiff the pay-
ment of three certain promissory
notes, dated November 17, 1909, and
payable on or before one, two and
three years after date, respectively,
for the sum of \$1,500 each, with in-
terest thereon at the rate of 7 per
cent per annum from date, and rea-
sonable attorney's fees, in the event
suit should be necessary to collect
same, two of such notes, with inter-

est thereon from date, being now un-
paid.

Plaintiff prays a decree against you

1. That he be given a judgment
against you for the principal sum of
\$3,000, with interest thereon, at the
rate of 7 per cent per annum since
November 17, 1909; for the sum of
\$206.28, taxes, including penalties
and interest, on said property for the
years 1909, 1910 and 1911, with in-
terest thereon, at the rate of 7 per
cent per annum, since April 27, 1912;
for the sum of \$1,219, assessments
and charges levied against said prop-
erty by the Klamath Water Users As-
sociation, and the United States of
America, on account of irrigating
said land for the years 1910, 1911
and 1912, with interest thereon at the
rate of 7 per cent per annum since
May 1, 1912; for the sum of \$500,
attorneys' fee, and for costs and dis-
bursements of suit and accruing
costs.

2. That execution and order of
sale issue in said suit to the sheriff
of Klamath County, Oregon, and that
sale be made, as on foreclosure, as
provided by law, on all of said real
property, or a sufficient portion
thereof to satisfy each of said unpaid
notes and mortgage and interest
thereon, as aforesaid, to pay said
taxes, interest and penalties, with in-
terest thereon, as aforesaid; to pay
said assessments and charges levied
for irrigation purposes, with interest
thereon, as aforesaid; to pay said at-
torneys' fee, and to pay the costs and
disbursements of suit and accruing
costs.

3. That all right, title and interest
of you, and each of you, in and to
said property, or any portion thereof
sold as aforesaid, be foreclosed, as
provided by law.
