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THE PRODUCTS ARE WHAT COUNT

East and Middle West, and carry the message directly. These men would hold meetings in school houses and country churches, talking directly to the country population and answering their questions. The exposition we could place in the city halls, armories, convention halls, and elsewhere in towns and cities of from 10,000 to 50,000 population. Such a campaign will cost \$30,000 a year, and will reach half a million people. It will cost just about what some one city is spending trying to get free publicity; it will cost just about what fifteen communities pay for booklets each year—and it will reach the people.

"We have planned to hold another land products show in the twin cities of Minnesota, this year in Minneapolis, because these cities are the gateway to the American Northwest. Through them passes a very large percentage of the settlers coming into the Northwest. The Canadian government has centralized on St. Paul and Minneapolis. They have whole blocks of offices in these cities, and show thousands of people what others are doing in the Canadian Northwest.

"Last year we showed 93,000 people what the seven states will produce when we held a land show in St. Paul. That is more people than Canada has met in St. Paul in three years. This year we will unquestionably show 200,000 people our products and reach interested ones with our literature, or as many as Canada can show in the Twin Cities in six years. We must make this enterprise a success, and then the way is paved for a campaign reaching beyond the Twin Cities down into the states where the people are restless and demand larger opportunities.

"The time has not yet come for us to reach into Europe, but we must meet the alien at the port of entry and tell him about the opportunities on our lands. Many of them have been farmers in the old country, and would be farmers in this country if they were given the information before they go into the cities. There they are robbed of means that would place them on lands and are heaped together in great masses of humanity which form cruel whirlpools in which innumerable lives are ceaselessly drawn down.

"The alien demands honest advertising. He wants the authority of the government of the United States behind the information about our lands. That is why the Northwest Development League is asking congress to establish a bureau in connection with the department of commerce and labor, which will collect and publish information about our vacant lands and our resources, print it in thirty languages, if necessary, and make it obligatory on the department to distribute this information at our ports of entry.

"The time is coming when the United States will recognize as a function of the government the work of securing desirable settlers and distributing them. The proposition is not taken very seriously now, even when we tell our congressmen and lawmakers that another country is investing \$1,000,000 annually in this work, and has been for five years. It has been securing 100,000 of our farmers annually. If the accepted estimate that a farmer's life work is worth \$20,000 to the community in which he lives is correct, then it follows that Canada's investment of \$5,000,000 in a publicity campaign has allied to her wealth to the value of \$5,000,000,000 net, considering her gains from Europe.

"The Northwest Development League must maintain a representative in Washington at the next session of congress. We must get a domestic immigration policy established first. More efficiency is needed in our commercial clubs in the American Northwest. Doing some good work as far as their own communities are concerned, they are unconscious of a larger unity of life. Growth cannot be obtained by any community by blindly struggling for itself against all others, and ignoring the country about it which must support it and make it grow."
