PETITIONS FOR NEW TAX LAWS

COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY LAST
LEGISLATURE HAS PREPARED
FOUR TAX MEASURES FOR SUB-
MISSION BY INITIATIVE

By resolution of the last legisla-
tive assembly a committee of five
from the senate and seven from the
house was appointed to act jointly
with the board of state tax commis-
sioners in the preparation of mea-
sures relating to taxation, to be sub-
mitted through the initiative. This
action was deemed advisable on ac-
count of the situation created by the
amendment to the constitution adopted
at the last election, requiring all
bills regulating taxation to be sub-
mitted to the people.

After careful consideration the
committee has prepared four mea-
sures, petitions for which have been
received in Klamath Falls, and are
now being circulated.

The first provides for a constitu-
tional amendment giving definite au-
thority for the taxation of incomes.
If this amendment is adopted a law
can then be enacted carrying out the
purpose of the amendment. The in-
come tax law recently enacted in
Wisconsin offers a splendid basis for
such legislation.

The purpose of the second bill is
to amend section 3554 of Lord's Ore-
gon Laws by placing therein (see
paragraph of proposed bill) a provi-
sion exempting from taxation all
household furniture and effects actu-
ally in use in homes; also all wearing
apparel and similar personal effects
actually in use. This class of per-
sonal property is entirely unpro-
ductive, and its complete exemption
is amply justified from considera-
tions both of equity and practical
efficiency in taxation.

The third bill, if enacted, would
abolish double taxation, and the in-
equities of the present system of tax-
ing credits. The state of Washing-
ton several years ago enacted a law
to this effect, and it has proved highly
satisfactory.

The fourth measure would amend
our inheritance tax law to conform
to the model law on this subject re-
commended by the National Tax As-
sociation. This model law has recently
been enacted in New York, and
will doubtless be approved by many
other states in the near future. The
administrative work under the pro-
posed law is placed in the hands of
the board of state tax commissioners.
