UNIONS OBJECT TO CONVICT-MADE BRICK

Strong Protest is Made Against Plac-
ing Product of Prisoners on the
Open Market—Governor's An-
nouncement Comes as a Surprise

SALEM, June 14.—Advocates of
labor unions are voicing protests
against Governor West's policy of
leasing the penitentiary brickyard to
private contractors for the purpose
of placing brick on the market at a
profit, and it is possible that, to pro-
tect free labor as far as possible
against the competition which it will
meet from the convicts, they will de-
mand that the contractors observe a
law passed by the last legislature pro-
viding that all "goods, wares and
merchandise" manufactured by con-
victs be marked "convict made."

The announcement of the governor
and the contractors that they intend,
in addition to supplying the state with
brick, to place it on the market at a
profit has come to the laboring ele-
ment as a surprise. They call atten-
tion to the fact that the governor is
the author of a bill which it is pro-
posed to initiate with the road bills
prohibiting the employment of con-
victs of the penitentiary by any pri-
vate person, firm or corporation, and
they are unable to reconcile this with
his leasing of the brickyard for the
purpose of placing brick on the mar-
ket, as this will bring convict labor in
direct competition with free labor.

While they fully agree that the in-
dustries to be installed at the peni-
tentiary with the money to be derived
from the sale of brick may be of ben-
efit to the convicts, they feel that the
governor, in order to acquire the
money has been compelled to evade the
law by the creation of "dummy"
contractors, and that this course is
not commendable and especially is
not when, in addition to evading the
law, free labor must suffer because of
competition with the cheap convict
labor.

The last Legislature, evidently with
the view of protecting labor from suf-
fering from competition with convict
labor, passed a law providing that
all "goods, wares and merchandise"
manufactured by the convicts should
be marked "convict made," and a se-
vere penalty is provided for failure to
observe it. By marking the goods,
the public is made aware of how they
are manufactured, and it gives those
in sympathy with the laboring men
an opportunity to decline to purchase
them and favor the products of free
labor. The law is held to apply to the
brick to be manufactured by the con-
victs, and it is likely that those op-
posed to the convicts entering into
competition with free labor in this
industry will ask for its rigid en-
forcement.
