after settlers who are familiar with your particular branch of farming, and if you have something to offer them better than they have in their own section, you are sure of getting them.

K. Sugarman of the Portland Store told of his early experience in Klamath Falls, and of the difficulties at that time of travel and the expense of shipping goods. He remarked that he came to Klamath Falls determined to stay, and had never been sorry of his action.

W. Paul Johnson stated that he wished to call the attention of the publicity men from the outside to some of the resources of Klamath county, which they might not become acquainted with on their short visit here and contemplated trip to the Upper Lake. He stated that no doubt they would gain a good idea of this section as a sportsmen's paradise or tourist resort, but Crater Lake, Pelican Bay, Spring Creek and the Lava Beds were only a few of the things that Klamath could boast of. He stated that there were 1,000,000 acres of agricultural land, of which Klamath Falls was the center. Attention was called to the ten billion feet of timber on the reservation; six billion feet on the forest reserve; and ten billion feet in private ownership.

"When the new lumber and box plants now contemplated for this section are in operation," said Mr. Johnson, "it will result in doubling the present population of Klamath Falls. Within a few years there will be enough people in this city to occupy practically every lot within the present limits."

Mr. Johnson stated that his company has spent \$112,000 in advertising Klamath Falls and Klamath county. Some of this, he said, had been wasted, as the advertising had been directed toward the wrong class of people. His company had no farm lands for sale, as all the lands under irrigation were reduced to 160 acres in one holding, so it was difficult to interest anyone in spending any money to induce farmers to come here. He believed that the development of the lumber industry would be one of the greatest factors in the up-building of the city and county. This was the idea on which he was working at present. "I figure," said Mr. Johnson, "that we can get better results

by spending \$500 in getting one lumberman interested in our timber than we could by spending the same amount in inducing farmers to settle here, every time a lumberman comes here and builds a saw mill or a factory, he will bring 100 men with him. I believe the farmers will come as soon as we have the population to provide the markets for the farm products." Mr. Johnson said his company would continue to exploit every resource of the county, but that he believed the greater results would be secured in the timber industry in getting quick results.

The visitors went to the Upper Lake today, and from the expressions made by Mr. Cooper after learning of the commercial resources of the county, he may remain over for a longer period than contemplated in order to become better acquainted with the country.
