THE CHARTER COMMISSION

ON THE initiative of a petition
from the citizens and taxpayers,
the city council will appoint a com-
mission to draft and formulate a new,
workable charter for the city of
Klamath, containing a repealing act
to do away with all measures now en-
cumbering the records of the city.

The council has not yet determined
the number or manner in which the
members of this commission will be
selected, but has the matter under
consideration. It has been suggested
that each councilman choose one man
on the commission and the mayor
choose one, making a total of eleven
members. This would give every
ward in the city two representatives
and one member from the city at
large, and the commission would then
be as near as possible representative
of the voters of the entire city, and
every section would have an equal
part in the determination of what the
new charter should contain.

It has also been suggested that
these men be paid a reasonable sum
for their services, so that the city will
be in a position to demand for the
people an expeditious and proper con-
sideration of the drafting of this
vitally important measure. The sum
of \$200 for each member has been
suggested as a proper compensation.

This is a matter in which every
voter in the city is interested, and
after extensive interviews with the
taxpayers, we find that the belief is
general that \$2,200 is too much money
to spend for this purpose at this
time, in view of the present financial
condition of the city. It is believed
that the best results, out of eleven
members there will be three or four
who will have to do the bulk of the
work, and the money expended on the
balance will be practically thrown
away.

The suggestion has been made
which appears to us as a wise one,
that the council, as a body, name five
men, who are capable and have the
legal knowledge to draft a measure of
this nature. Let these men be paid
\$200 each, or whatever may seem
equitable, for their services. Then
let the commission of eleven men be
appointed to represent every ward
and section of the city to act as an
advisory board, and determine what
provisions or measures shall be con-
tained in the charter. The working
commission of five men can then draft
the necessary sections to meet the
views of the representatives of the
voters. It is necessary, in drawing
up a charter, to have the assistance
of the best legal advice possible, so that
the provisions of the measure can be
enforced, and will stand the tests of
the courts. This is the assistance
that it will be necessary to pay for.

It would be impossible to permit
every man who might be interested in
some portion of the charter to appear
before the men drafting the instru-
ment, and make suggestions as to
what it should contain, but it is also
the right that every voter, who may
desire, should be heard in the matter.
This could be done by having them
present the matter to the representa-
tives of their wards, and if favorable
to the commission, the drafters could
be instructed to incorporate it in the
provisions of the charter.

It would be practically impossible
to secure eleven men from the several
wards of the city who are equipped
with the necessary experience or
knowledge of drawing up a charter
in proper legal form, and while their
suggestions and advice is needed, and
there should be such a commission to
pass on what the new charter should
be, such a commission should and should
not contain, we do not believe that it
is necessary for the good of the tax-
payers of the city that they should be
paid the sum of \$2,200, in view of the
fact that it would probably be neces-
sary to employ in addition legal au-
thority to pass on the legality of the
measure and possibly make many al-
terations in the instrument to make it
conform to the law.

FRESH FROM THE FORT

Fort Klamath, June 18.—The new
creamery being built by the Wood
River Valley Cream and Butter Asso-
ciation is nearing completion, the
lathing and plastering will commence
tomorrow morning. This work will
be done by J. W. Truett of Klamath
Falls. The general management of
the building is under Marion Loo-
ley, and he is making every effort to
have it completed by the 1st of July.
He claims that the first roll of butter
from the new creamery will be up at
auction before the Fourth of July.
The highest bid to date for the first
roll is \$15. No doubt there will be a
great many bids, and the price of the
first roll will be about the highest
price ever paid for butter in the state
of Oregon. The first day's run of the
creamery will be celebrated by a big
dance given at Fort Klamath.

It is understood that Abner Weed
has sold his 23,000 acres of land in
Wood River Valley to the Klamath
Development company, and, if so, you
may look for lively times in this fer-
tile valley from now on, for the K. D.

CAMPAIGN SIMILAR

TO THAT OF 1880

CHICAGO, June 18.—Every politi-
cal student who has delved into those
musty archives wherein are kept the
records that tell of great political bat-
tles past and gone, must be struck
with the similarity of the pre-nomi-
nation fight waged by Colonel Roose-
velt this year and that conducted by
General Ulysses S. Grant exactly thirty-
two years ago.

Grant's campaign was for the re-
publican nomination for the third
term after a lapse of four years—40
is Roosevelt's.

Grant was a soldier of achievement
—as is the hero of San Juan Hill.

Grant's campaign followed a world-
widening trip, during which he receiv-
ed the welcome and praise of strange
sovereigns and people—Roosevelt has
not lately returned from his African
hunt, and a triumphant tour through
Europe.

And Grant was the popular idol of
the people—a claim made for Colonel
Roosevelt by his supporters.

But not alone are the two cam-
paigns similar in these particulars.
The construction of the Grant and
Roosevelt campaign has many points
in common, for Grant was opposed by
Blaine—even as Roosevelt is opposed
by Taft.

The fight in the convention hall
was one of the bitterest ever fought
in the annals of the republican party
history.

The convention convened in Chi-
cago on June 2, 1880, with over 10,
000 spectators lining in the galleries
to watch the battle royal. And for
over a week the Blaine and Grant
forces battled together before Gar-
field, a dark horse, won the nomi-
nation.
