

CITY CONTRIBUTES FOR BAND CONCERT

The finance committee to which was referred the petition for an appropriation of \$150 a month for four months during the summer to the Klamath Military band, to assist them in giving free weekly concerts, recommended that the band be allowed \$100 a month. The report was approved by the council, and the ordinance introduced at the last meeting was amended to conform with the committee's report, and passed. It will be effective thirty days from last night.

for all appropriation bills. It is made his duty to introduce appropriation measures, and no other member is allowed to do so, except in the case of an appropriation to be referred to the people. The legislature is deprived of power to increase an appropriation over the figures set by the governor, and the governor, on the other hand, is deprived of the veto power.

In case of vacancies special elections are to be ordered, and the new member is to have the voting power of the man he is chosen to succeed. Annual sessions are provided. The presiding officer is to be elected from outside the membership of the legislature, and he is to have no voice or vote in legislation.

The franchise section limits the duration of franchises to thirty years, and provides how property may be taken over by the state for its physical value and a bonus of 20 per cent. Valuable domain is defined, and fifteen prohibitions are given against the passage of special or local laws. Pay of legislators is fixed at \$2 per day, as at present.

The measure as revised and now circulated does not provide for recall of the legislature as a whole, does not amend the recall, does not extend pro-

portional representation to any officer except members of the legislature, and does not make sheriffs and district attorneys appointive by the governor, as provided in a former draft.

APPLICATIONS RECEIVED FOR 250,000,000 FEET LUMBER

MEDFORD, June 18.—M. L. Erickson, supervisor of the Crater National forest, has returned from the Klamath country, where the sale of a large acreage of timber is claiming his attention. The government has received applications for 220,000,000 feet of yellow pine, which will represent \$700,000, in round numbers when sold. Of this amount 25 per cent, or \$175,000, will go to the counties in which the national forest is situated, according to the area of the county within the forest. As 70 per cent of the Crater National forest is in Jackson county this county will receive 70 per cent of the \$175,000, or about \$125,000. If the sale is made it is paid in installments covering a period of ten years.

Mr. Erickson is now making a very careful study of market conditions, and also of forestry matters in connection with the cutting of such a large amount of yellow pine on the east slope of the Cascades, in order to determine whether the bids which will be received for the timber will be sufficient to warrant its sale, and also to determine whether the cutting of this amount of timber will jeopardize the future value of the forest.

BOIVIN AWARDED BIG CONTRACT

Henry Boivin was today awarded the contract for the plumbing and heating plant in the three-story building erected by Melrose Brothers. The upper two stories of the building will be arranged for hotel purposes, and will be equipped with a large amount of modern plumbing. Heat for the entire building will be supplied from a steam plant. The contract secured by Boivin is the largest awarded in this city this year.

CHICAGO, June 18.—Johnson and other progressives backed Flynn when he entered his protest concerning the Pennsylvania vote, but the police cleared the aisle and the roll call proceeded. It then developed that Roosevelt's plans to capture the convention by force had gone awry. It had been planned that when 501 votes were cast for McGovern he was to take the platform, and whatever the total vote showed the Roosevelt-ers were to proceed with their own convention. At this point George Record of New Jersey said: "If Root is elected the Roosevelt-ers will submit and make their fight before the credentials committee."

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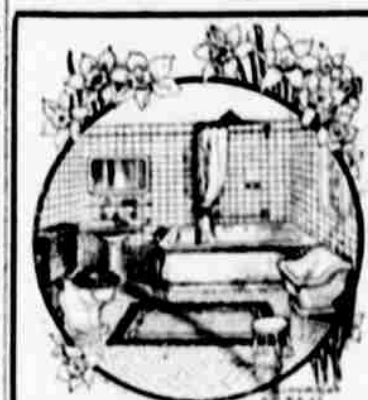
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
