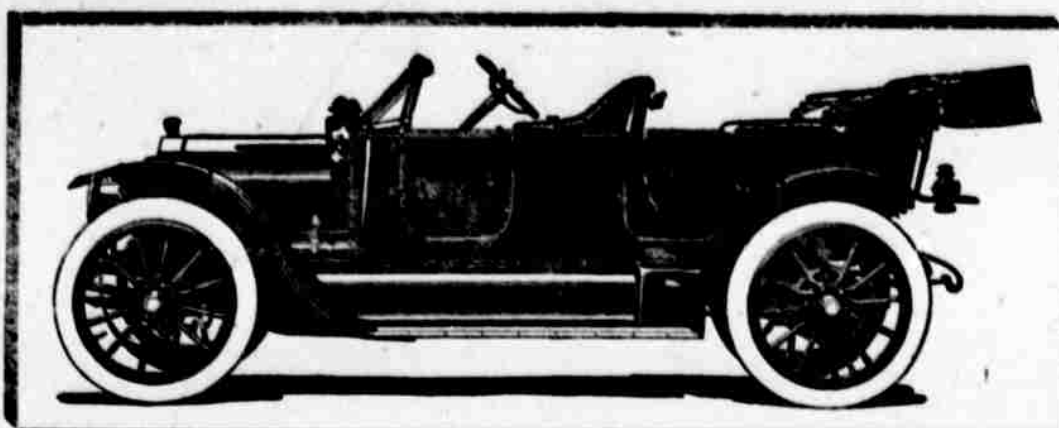

BOOKLET ISSUED BY THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

"Service to the State" is the text of a handsome booklet which has just been issued by the Oregon Agricultural College. "Dignifying the Industries" is the booklet's title. It describes the vast variety of training afforded by the college in fitting men and women for practical usefulness and success. There is a definition of the college's usefulness, which reads:

"Service to the state in all its needs; aid for the individual in his preparation for life and the community in its efforts in behalf of the citizens; in a word, a material addition to the prosperity, the health and happiness of all who come within the wide circle of its influences—this is the aim of the Oregon Agricultural College. The home—the heart of the community—the marts of trade, and all the vast multitude of agricultural and professional activities which fill the larders and coffers of the world, receive each year from the college gates hundreds of new recruits. They are girded with a knowledge brought by years of hard study, and eager to apply it in making their homes, their farms and orchards, their forests and mines, their towns and cities, the best in the state; and their state the best in the Nation."

"This year the college gave special training in one or another of twenty different lines of instruction to 2,882 persons at the institution. Thousands of others were reached by demonstration trains and other extension agencies. Every county of Oregon, as well as twenty-three other states and eight foreign countries have representatives among its students."

Illustrated pages are occupied with descriptions of the work done by the college in animal husbandry, agronomy, horticulture, dairy husbandry,

forestry, home economics, engineering, commerce, extension work, art and architecture, music and many other subjects. The booklet is one of the most valuable ever issued by the college.

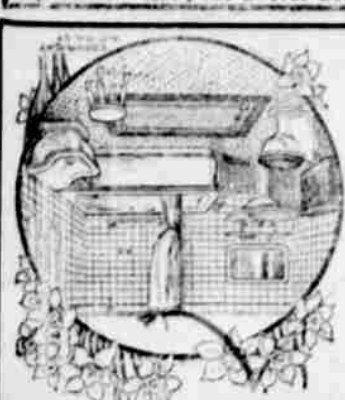
