

ASKS RE-SURVEY OF SHIPPINGTON

PETITION IS PRESENTED TO THE
COUNCIL BY TWO-THIRDS OF
THE PROPERTY OWNERS ASK-
ING FOR NEW SURVEY

A petition was presented to the council asking for permission to re-survey Shippington addition. The petition was signed by Chas. E. Worden, the Klamath Development company, Thos. Drake, Chas. McGowan, J. L. Cunningham and a number of other property owners in the addition, who claimed that they composed two-thirds of the owners in that section of the city.

The petition was accompanied by a resolution authorizing E. B. Henry and W. P. Hughes to make a re-survey of the addition without cost to the city. It was stated that the old survey, which had been filed with the county, was a foot out of line. The petition was referred to the street committee for a report at the next meeting. One of the councilmen re-

marked that he believed that they should hear from the other one-third of the property owners before any action was taken.

SIXTY DAYS EXTENSION GRANTED PAVING CO.

Herman Force, representative of the Warren Construction company, asked the council for sixty days' extension on the time for the completion of the paving of Bond, Broad and Esplanade streets. He stated that the contract had been awarded and drawn up in April, and called for the completion of the work by July 1st. On account of the charter question the contract had not been signed until last week, and it would be impossible to complete the work in the time of the contract. The council voted to grant an extension of sixty days. Mr. Force stated that it would take about thirty days to do the work, and it would take some time to get the material in.

FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUBS

(Continued from Page 1)

Mrs. Phillip North Moore, for four years the President of the national Federation will respond in the name of the 9,000 women whom the thousands present represented. She will declare that the word, "conservation" struck the keynote of what the great woman's movement of the present day stands for, and that the Federated Club Women of America have no platform unless it be broad platform summed up in "women, children and home," meaning in the last, not only the individual home, but the city, the state, the nation.

The leaders in San Francisco declared today that this biennial marks a tremendous stride ahead by the women in this country. A new breadth has left its imprint on the program, that will even govern the conduct of the debate over the two great questions that are to engage the convention.

Is suffrage to be adopted by the General Federation?

Is the Pennsylvania plan of government for future sessions of this body to be adopted?

Mrs. Sarah S. Platt Decker, the noted Colorado suffragist, said today that the very fact that California, the latest suffrage state, with its genuine accomplishments behind it, is entertaining the biennial, will turn the tide in favor of the adoption of this resolution almost by acclaim. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, now in the Orient, who was to have introduced the resolution, cannot be present. It is thought that either Mrs. Decker or Miss Sophonisba Breckinridge, the New York suffragist, who is counting on the endorsement in next year's New York suffrage fight, will appeal to the 3,000 delegates for the endorsement this week.

The Pennsylvania plan is the reorganization of the Federation into a congress, the senate to be composed of state presidents, state secretaries and convention delegates, and the house to be composed of delegated members from every individual club, each body to be presided over by a vice president of the general federation, while the president of the federation is the general manager of the whole. There is tremendous opposition to this plan, especially by the Western wing, who consider it oligarchic in tendency. They say that the obscure club will be virtually nonexistent as far as voice in the government of the federation goes. Under the present plan, with every delegate having a voice on the floor of the convention in the direction of national affairs, the representation, the insurgents declare, is fair to the small club. The president of the Pennsylvania State Federation, Mrs. Edward W. Biddle, who originated the plan, will introduce it this week, and fire the opening gun for the plan on the floor of the convention.

The contest over, this matter of government has made even the election of the next president a matter of lesser importance. Mrs. Phillip Carpenter, the brilliant New Yorker for eight years a practicing attorney, president of the New York Women Lawyers' Club and past president of the Sorosis Club, will swing the powerful Eastern delegation in her favor, with a small section of the West, including California, is the forecast. Mrs. Carpenter was a Mills College girl, and for many years a Californian. She has many friends throughout this state.

Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker, the popular Texas club woman, is likely to rally the votes of the Solid South and the Middle Western clubs around her, the "politicians" say. Mrs. Pennybacker, a gifted woman, the author of the text books used in the public schools of Texas, and one of the hardest workers on the endowment plan of the General Federation, is considered by many the logical president. The fact that through Mrs. Pennybacker the largest amount raised by any state for endowment came from Texas carries weight with many of the delegates. These two leaders today laughed over the rivalry which they have each sworn will make no difference in their long friendship.

Women of the federation today are pointing with pride to this year's program and its absence of men experts for the special addresses. The ten days' program has but eight men speakers on the whole roster of celebrities, the names of the world-celebrated women throwing the men far into the shade. The men who will speak are H. L. Weil, secretary of the National Pennsylvania Recreation Association; Capt. J. B. White, National Conservation Congress; H. H. Gross, president National Home Fertilization League; William Hard, the author; Hecton Ariotti, artist, O. E. M., S. D.; Clinton Rogers Woodruff, secretary of the National Consumers' League; J. Horace McFarland, president American Civic Association, and Overton W. Price, forestry expert of Washington, D. C.

Among those who made up the long roster of celebrated women speakers in San Francisco today are Professor Maria Sanford of the University of

Michigan; Louise Graham, the journalist; Mrs. Frederick Nathan, first vice president of the National Conservation League; Miss Laura Drake Gill, D. C. L., of the University of the South; Mrs. A. Barton Miller, president Women's Rivers and Harbors commission; Dr. Rachael Varros, the social worker of Hull House; Mrs. A. F. Morrison, president National Collegiate Alumnae; Dr. Jessica Flexott, of the University of California; Mrs. Philip Carpenter, L. L. B.; Baroness Von Suttner, the celebrated Austrian author, who will plead for world peace; Mrs. Francis Squires Potter, and Miss Julia C. Lathrop, Washington, D. C., of the National Children's bureau.
