JAMES ROASTS TAFT AND TEDDY

"THE ONE LIVING AMERICAN WHOSE NAME WILL SHINE IN HISTORY IS W. J. BRYAN OF NEBRASKA"

BALTIMORE, June 27.—In his speech as permanent chairman, Ollie James bitterly denounced President Taft and derided Colonel Roosevelt, lavishing him to join the democrats. He denounced the Chicago squabble, and predicted democratic success at the polls next November. In conclusion he said:

"The progressive spirit that is sweeping this country is called by some 'the principles of the progressives,' by others, 'the doctrines of the insurgents,' but way back yonder, when the voice in the Western wilderness cried out for them, they were called 'the vagaries of Bryan, the dreamer.' However much we may differ in convention, we must all admit the one living American whose name will shine in history, studied by thousands of flaming stars, only behind those of Jefferson and Jackson—that of W. J. Bryan of Nebraska."

SACRAMENTO, June 27.—Governor Johnson was given an ovation at the depot by 500 admirers wearing red bandanas. An auto parade followed him to the capitol, headed by a brass band.

He said: "It has been a bully fight this time."

He was accompanied by Lissner and Langdon, and at the conclusion of the parade he spoke to the gathering from the capitol steps.

HAS MAKING OF A POLITICIAN

YOUNGSTER GIVES PROMISE OF BECOMING A DISTINGUISHED POLITICIAN WHEN HE ATTAINS A FEW MORE YEARS

BALTIMORE, June 28.—There is a youngster among the pages at the democratic convention in Baltimore who gives promise of becoming a distinguished politician when he attains a few more years. He is Harry Schaefer, a "kid" of little more than 13 years, the son of an official of the navy department.

Employees of the federal civil service with large families do not have very large bank accounts as a rule, and Harry's father is not an exception to the rule. The boy conceived the idea of earning his own way. He remembered that Representative Hobson of Alabama was engaged in trying to block the entrance to the harbor of Santiago about the time that he, Harry, was born. He interviewed Mr. Hobson, and calling attention to the fact that his father was connected with the navy department, asked the ex-captain to secure him a place as a page on the floor of the house of representatives. Captain Hobson was taken with the enterprise of the youngster, and complied with his request. Harry concluded that he would like to see a national convention "from the inside." He borrowed a typewriter and wrote out half a dozen letters of recommendation for himself. These he took to Speaker Clark, Leader Underwood and other prominent democrats, and asked their signatures. They all complied with the request.

Then he wrote an application to Mr. Urey Woodson, secretary of the national committee, and enclosed the letters. Mr. Woodson, in a letter to Speaker Clark, promised the appointment, and added that such a youngster is too good a politician to be kept down.

That's how it happens that among the pages at the convention in Baltimore is Harry Schaefer, some day destined to be known as more than a page.
