

Democrats In Deadlock May Adjourn For Month

FIGHT EXPECTED IN CITY COUNCIL

CLIMAX WILL BE REACHED IN POLICE SQUABBLE

Members of the Council Who Are Supporting the Efforts of Certain Saloons in an Attempt to Have the Present Police Force Removed Will Have to Show Their Hands at Meeting Tonight

There seems to be some people in Klamath Falls who are, for some unknown reason, opposed to the present police force of the city, and would like to see a change made to re-instate some of the former officers in place of the ones appointed by Mayor Nicholas. Just what the objection is to the present officers it is a difficult matter to determine, or exactly who it is that has so great an influence that they are able to enlist the active support of some members of the council.

No charge has been made or filed against the police officers, and it seems that the objection comes from a portion of the saloons and the red light district people. No intimation or charge has ever been made that any of the present officers have failed in any respect in carrying out their instructions and enforcing the law, and it would seem almost unbelievable that any member of the council would be governed in their actions by the element that is interested in removing worthy officers from their positions.

Nevertheless the rumor has continued to spread that there will be something doing at the council meeting tonight, and that the entire force, with the exception of Patrolman Hall, are to be removed by the council, and that new officers are to be appointed. Mayor Nicholas is not saying anything, but those who know him are confident that he is not a man to lay down in any fight, if it is forced on him.

An unsuccessful fight was made when the new administration went into office by certain members to prevent the confirmation of the mayor's appointments, and rumors and claims of what was going to be done have become so frequent that it is positive that the crisis will be reached at the meeting tonight.

If the opposition to the mayor attempts to carry out their plans, the people of the city, who have every confidence in the executive of the city, going to demand the specific charges on which the council acts, and will want to know the identity of the persons who are so anxious to have a change in the police force.

Thomas F. Donahue, representing the Mergenthaler Linotype company, and traveling out of the San Francisco agency of the concern, is in this city today looking after the interests of the firm. While in this city several years ago Mr. Donahue purchased a piece of land near the Southern Pacific depot, and in speaking of it today he expressed the wish that he had bought "ten times as much."

FUNERAL WILL BE HELD SATURDAY

BODY OF THE LATE FRED T. SANDERSON WILL ARRIVE IN KLAMATH FALLS ON WEDNESDAY EVENING

Judge George Noland, Worshipful Master of the Masonic Lodge, has received notice from Ashland that the body of the late Fred T. Sanderson will arrive in Klamath Falls on the Wednesday evening train, and that the funeral is to be held Saturday.

Shortly after the news of the unexpected death of the former mayor was announced in the Herald Saturday evening, it was the one topic of conversation throughout the entire city. Expressions of the deepest regret were heard on all sides, and it is some time since anything has occurred that has caused as great a shock to the people of this city as the sudden passing away of Mr. Sanderson.

Mr. Sanderson and wife went to Ashland about two weeks ago, where an operation was performed on his knee, which had been causing him trouble for some time. It was announced by the doctors that he had appendicitis, and he agreed to an operation. The second operation occurred at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning, and apparently he underwent the ordeal successfully, and friends in this city did not have the least idea but that his recovery would be rapid. The possibility of his death was so unexpected that many of his closest friends could not believe but that there had been some mistake in the message.

"FREE FOR ALL" IN CONVENTION

STRAIN OF DELEGATES REACHES BREAKING POINT

Missourians and Nebraskans Have a Rough and Tumble Fight, Which Throws the Whole Front of the Hall into a Howling, Fighting Mob, Which Fought Furiously for Ten Minutes

BALTIMORE, July 1.—After the roll call for the thirty-third ballot the Missourians unfurled a sign carrying a quoted endorsement of Clark by Bryan, and rushed it to the Nebraska delegation, shouting "What are you going to do about it?"

Bryan, livid with rage, rushed to the platform, while the police endeavored to quell a dozen or more riot fights. A free-for-all over the banner occurred before the press stand. A dozen Missourians raised the banner on the press section, and were thrown bodily to the floor. One reporter representing a New York paper, flattened out a Missourian who had endeavored to walk on him. By this time the whole front of the hall was in possession of a howling mob, which fought furiously for ten minutes until the banner was removed. When order was finally restored Bryan was sitting on the rail around the platform awaiting hearing.

James finally refused to allow Bryan to explain the banner. Bryan resumed his seat smiling grimly.

SENATOR WORKS PRAISES BRYAN

ATTACKS BOTH TAFT AND ROOSEVELT, AND SAYS HE WONT SUPPORT THE FORMER AND DOES NOT FAVOR NEW PARTY

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 1.—Senator Works of California, in the senate today attacked both Roosevelt and Taft and both conventions, but lauded Bryan. He said the contest between Taft and Roosevelt was an "unexampled spectacle" and asserted that the Taft nomination was procured by fraudulent and illegal methods and was tainted, and that he would not support Taft, although he did not favor a new party.

He praised the work performed for civic righteousness by Bryan in the Baltimore convention.

WINNIPEG, July 1.—Thirty-five bodies have been recovered from the ruins of the buildings rased in a tornado which partially wrecked Regina yesterday. The death list probably will not exceed 50, and the injured 200, some of whom will die. The tornado caused a property loss of from \$4,000,000 to \$10,000,000.

WILLIS TRIAL IS CONCLUDED

CASE GOES TO THE JURY LATE THIS AFTERNOON—DEFENDANT IS CHARGED WITH PERJURY IN AFFIDAVIT OF LIES

The jury trial of Richard Willis, charged on a grand jury indictment for perjury in connection with a sworn inventory of losses occasioned by a fire on his property at Lakeview will reach the jurors this afternoon. Willis had two insurance policies, amounting to \$4,000, and the amount of his loss he calculated as \$7,300. In his address to the jury this afternoon District Attorney Kuykendall scorched the accused, claiming that the contention with regard to his age, which is 57 years, mitigated against him.

"It is no excuse," said Kuykendall, "but rather reason for punishment." The prosecuting attorney then went over the items in the bills itemized and sworn to by Mr. Willis, and said that the original inventory sworn to in one whole page was, as the evidence disclosed, false in every particular. He disputed the statement that the hearers and undertaking outfit were included in the policies. One aggregate total of \$1,750 was, he insisted, cut down fully \$1,000. He repudiated the idea that the defendant was deceived into perjury, saying that a man of his wide business experience, worth over \$100,000, having long business experience and giving supplies to the railroad and in many other transactions of a large nature, was not likely to be easily deluded into committing a grave crime unless he wanted to do so.

Attorney Rutenic, for the defendant, emphasized, as a feature for the defense, that Adjuster Radcliffe came there for the purpose of giving all the benefit to the insurance company, and protested that his desire was to deprive Mr. Willis of his rights under the policy. He, however, conceded that it was possible that Mr. Willis, whom he described as "this old man," may have mistaken the exactness of the inventory. But he contended that if he did it was trivial and did not vitiate the contract between him and the insurance company.

INITIATIVE BILL TO MAKE VOTING EASIER

SALEM, July 1.—A new initiative bill in circulation, relating to the subject of the residence and qualification of voters, has been received by Secretary of State Olcott. The bill has but few signatures, and was sent to the secretary of state unaccompanied by any letter.

Briefly, it provides that and citizen 21 years of age who shall have resided in the state thirty days preceding an election, and every person of foreign birth who shall have resided in the state thirty days preceding an election and has declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, shall be entitled to vote, and such right shall not be bridged or limited by property or other class qualifications. It also provides that when a person registers, he shall be provided with a certificate, and that when this is presented to the board of elections it shall entitle him to vote.

ONLY FIFTEEN INITIATIVE BILLS FOR THE BALLOT

WITH ONLY THREE MORE DAYS LEFT IN WHICH TO FILE PETITIONS THE LIST OF INITIATIVE MEASURES IS SMALL

SALEM, July 1.—With only three more days left in which initiative petitions may be filed with the secretary of state, the threatened avalanche of proposed measures is conspicuous by its absence, although, of course, it may yet flood the secretary of state's office. In addition to those measures referred to the people by the last legislature and those which have been on file for several months, only four new measures have been filed. These are of only local interest.

Including the University of Oregon and state normal referendum measures, a complete list of measures now on file for the November ballot is as follows:

- 1—Equal suffrage amendment extending the right of suffrage to women.
- 2—Constitutional amendment of section 8, article 5, for the purpose of creating the office of lieutenant governor, who shall act as governor in case of the inability of the governor to perform his duties, and also act as

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WILSON GAINS, CLARK LOSING

NEW JERSEY MAN PASSES THE SPEAKER ON THIRTIETH

Thirty-Four Ballots Taken and Still No Choice Made—Candidates Are Standing Pat, and It Is Probable That Convention May Adjourn While Special Primaries Are Held Throughout the Country

BALTIMORE, July 1.—Failure to reach a choice on the twenty-seventh ballot was the first distinct result of the chaos today, all candidates standing pat and Bryan still dominating.

It is believed that it will be Wilson today or a long drawn out deadlock, with the possibility of an adjournment for a month while special primaries are taken throughout the country. During the vote on the twenty-seventh ballot John B. Stanchfield of New York bitterly assailed Bryan, thereby participating an uproar. The ballot resulted: Clark 469, Wilson 406 1/2, Underwood 113, Harmon 29, Marshall 20, Bryan 1, Fox 28, absent 2 1/2.

BALTIMORE, July 1.—The convention was called to order by Chairman James at 1:03. Rev. G. Conle offered the invocation. Bryan entered immediately after the prayer, the galleries cheering uproariously. The majority of delegates were stolid. Butler declared: "We stand just where we were when the adjournment was taken on Saturday. We won't nominate today, tomorrow or Wednesday."

On the twenty-eighth ballot Indiana broke, giving 39 to Wilson and one to Kern, thereby causing the elimination of Marshall. The twenty-eighth ballot resulted: Clark 488 1/2, Wilson 487 1/2, Underwood 112 1/2, Harmon 29, Kern 1, Bryan 1, Fox 28, absent 1/2.

On the twenty-ninth ballot Indiana cast 4 votes for Kern. Thirteen Wilsonites on the Kansas delegation (one being absent) tried to cast the 20 Kansas votes for Wilson.

Bell of California tried to have 7 Clark votes cast, but was hooted down.

Chairman James decided that as 13 was two-thirds of 19 Kansas votes present, the state vote could go to Wilson. There was great applause at the decision.

The twenty-ninth ballot resulted—Clark 488 1/2, Wilson 426, Underwood 113, Harmon 29, Kern 4, Fox 28, absent 1/2.

There was no choice on the 30th ballot.

Wilson Passes Clark
On the thirtieth ballot the 8 votes of Vermont went for Wilson amid wild applause. The result of this ballot was: Clark 455, Wilson 460, Underwood 121 1/2, Harmon 19, Kern 2, Fox 20, absent 1/2.

The announcement that Ohio also broke to Wilson was greeted with an outburst of cheers. The result showing that Wilson passed Clark provoked a demonstration.

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Tri-weekly Train Service Starts To-day Between Midland and Chiloquin

With the inauguration of this switch train the Southern Pacific expects to handle the business in and about Klamath Falls in a very efficient manner, which will meet with the entire satisfaction of shippers. The train is in charge of Conductor Bradford, Brakemen Ball and Smith and Engineer Thornton and Fireman Nyline, and will tie up at Klamath Falls every night.

Bradleys Make a Record Catch of Trout During Onting at Spring Creek

Mr. and Mrs. George Bradley, returned Saturday evening from an outing at Spring Creek, lasting about eighteen days. Mr. Bradley has quite a reputation as a fisherman, but it kept him hustling this time to keep Mrs. Bradley from beating him at the fishing game. The two, during their stay at Spring Creek caught hooked 700 of the finest specimens of trout

that was ever taken in such large numbers from this famous fishing stream. All of the visitors to the camp who happened to have less ability were treated to trout dinners as often as desired, and they also brought home a lot of trout for distribution among their friends here. Mr. Bradley claims that he could have caught more, but did not want to exceed the limit.
