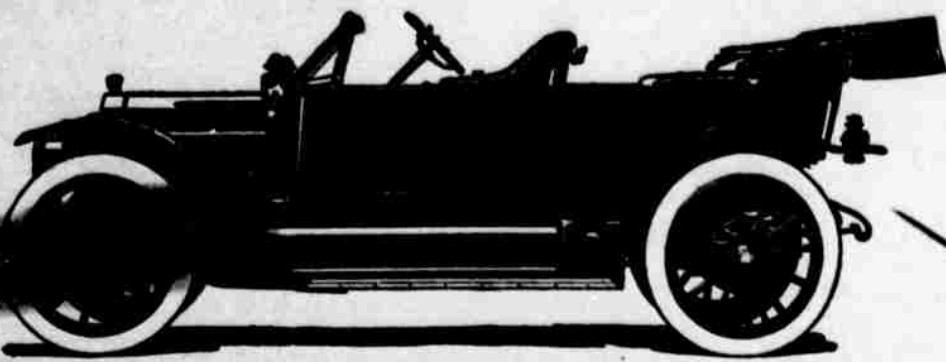

president of the senate, and providing for the president pro tem of the senate to act as governor in case of the inability of both the governor and lieutenant governor, and in case of the inability of the governor, lieutenant governor and president pro tem of the senate, the governor of the house to act as governor.

3—An amendment of section 1 article 9, of the Oregon Constitution, providing for a uniform rule of taxation, except on property specifically taxed, providing for the levy and collection of taxes for state purposes and for county and other municipal purposes upon different classes of property, and for the ascertainment, determination and application of an average rate of levy and taxation on property taxed for state purposes, and for apportioning state taxes among the several counties as county obligations by reasonable and equitable rules.

4—An amendment of section 32, article 1, Oregon constitution, for the

purpose of permitting taxes to be levied upon different classes of property at different rates, but providing that taxation must be uniform upon each separate class within the territorial limits of the authority levying the tax, and shall be levied and collected for public purposes only, and the power of taxation must never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away.

5—Constitutional amendment to repeal all of section 1, article 9, except that part prohibiting poll and head taxes in Oregon, and instead of the portions repealed, to add a provision the declaration of an emergency in any act by the legislature regulating taxation and exemptions.

6—Amendment of section 1, article 17 of the constitution so as to require for the adoption of any proposed constitutional amendment a majority vote or all the electors voting at such election, instead of a majority of those voting on the amendment only.

7—Constitutional amendment of section 3, article 11 of the constitution,

making stockholders in banking corporations liable to pay for the benefit of depositors an amount equal to the par value of stock held by any stockholder in addition to having originally paid the par value therefor.

8—Single tax measure for Clackamas county.

9—A measure to prevent the county court of Harney county building a court house, and to refund the money collected under a certain 3 mill tax levy of January 6, 1912.

10—A measure to create the county of Cascade out of the eastern half of Clackamas county, and fixing the salaries of officers and locating the temporary county seat at Estacada.

11—An act to provide funds to build roads and bridges in Jackson county and establish a taxpayers' national bank.

12—An act appropriating \$175,000 for building and equipping an administration building and extending heating plant to the same for the University of Oregon, and also appropriating the further sum of \$153,258.92 for the purchase of additional land, equipment and apparatus; making repairs, additions and improvements to buildings and grounds; paying salaries of instructors and employees; paying street assessments, and for additional maintenance of the correspondence study department of the University of Oregon.

13—An act appropriating \$175,000 for the construction, equipment and furnishing of a modern fire proof library and museum building, and to extension of the heating plant to the same, for the use of the University of Oregon.

14—An act vesting the railroad commission with power and jurisdiction to supervise and regulate every public service corporation and utility in the state of Oregon, as to the adequacy of the service rendered and facilities provided, the fairness of rates and charges to be collected from the public therefore, and also as to interchange of business between such public service corporations and utilities, the control over all such corporations and utilities as far as their

business has to do with the general public.

15—An act appropriating \$50,000 for building, furnishing and equipping a dormitory at the Oregon Normal school at Monmouth.

be invited to participate with exhibits, and the only thing that is worrying the local committee is to find a location big enough to house all the farm products that will be gathered here.

The assurance is given, however, that a suitable place will be provided, even if a temporary structure has to be built. Plans so far made provide for the holding of the land show during the final two weeks of November or early December. At that time the Northwest states will have harvested the biggest crops in their history, and the farmer will have something worth while to show to the less favored people in the cities and of other sections of the country.

G. E. A. Bond, for three years assistant secretary of the Spokane National Apple Show, has been engaged as secretary-manager of the coming land show, and headed by the Portland Commercial Club, the State Horticultural Society and Oregon Development League, practically all organizations of influence in the state have given the proposed show their hearty support.

It is the plan to make this land show an annual event in Portland, and it is expected it will grow in importance with each passing year. It is expected to prove as big an attraction for the winter as the Annual Rose Festival is for the summer.

Thirty-fourth—Clark 44 1/2, Wilson 47 1/2, Underwood 101 1/2, Harmon 29, Kern 2, Foss 28, absent 1/2. A recess was then taken until 8 o'clock.
