

BOLD JAUREZ AS AS REBEL CAPITAL

**FEDERAL ARMY IS MOVING ON
CITY AND OBSCURE BURNING
TROOPS TO CAPITAL DURING

POPE MAY TAKE HAND IN STOPPING REVOLUTIONS

ROME, July 16.—Pope Pius, it has been announced, may take a hand in the near future in correcting the penchant of Latin American republics to indulge in revolutions.

The step which the holy see is declared to have in mind will be only a part of the work he has just undertaken for improving the condition of the poorer classes of Central and South America. This work was initiated the past week with the issuance by the pope of an encyclical letter to all of the bishops and archbishops of the Central and South American republics, calling upon them for special efforts to better the condition of the native Indian population.

This letter, it was declared today, is soon to be followed by another calling upon all the Catholic officials in these countries to use their best efforts, not only in official circles, but in educating the people away from the idea of repeated revolutions. The pope is convinced that these revolutions are responsible for the misery of the masses. As he has always stood as a sort of international sponsor for the cause of universal peace, it is asserted in vatican circles that the expected encyclical letter will merely be in harmony with the well known attitude of the holy see against war.

LYCEUM BUREAU WILL SOON BE INCORPORATED

A meeting of the members of the Klamath Lyceum Bureau was held Tuesday afternoon in the chambers of Circuit Judge H. L. Benson, president of the bureau and all of the business of the last season's attractions was settled, and the bureau starts out with a clean slate for the coming season.

The exceptional success of the first year's entertainment has encouraged the members, and they have arranged for even a higher class of attractions than was presented last year. Nine entertainments are to be given in the course of the season, and in order to create a greater interest and support from the citizens, it was deemed advisable to incorporate. It is proposed to sell 100 shares in the corporation at \$1 a share, and it is believed that there will be no difficulty in disposing of the stock among the people of Klamath Falls, who desire to see high class entertainment.

This will give the bureau a fund to work on in case it should be needed and give the bureau something with which to pay its preliminary expense.
