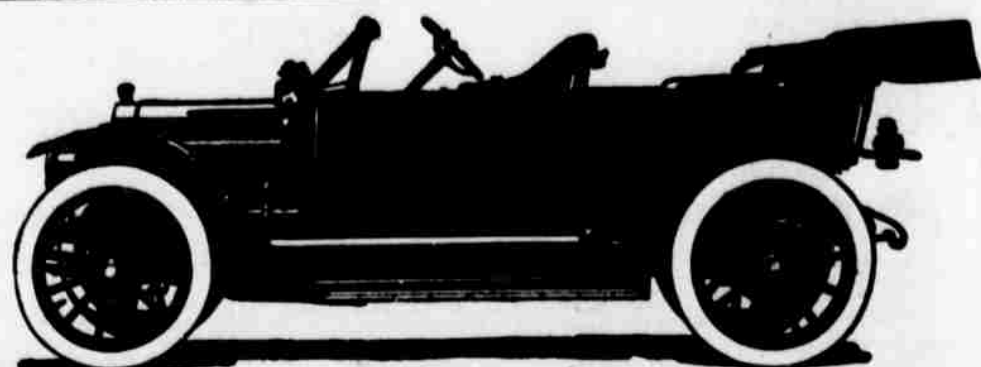

PROMS ALSO GET INTO A WRANGLE

NATIONAL PROHIBITION CONVENTION SPENDS ENTIRE SESSION WITHOUT ACCOMPLISHING RESULTS

United Press Service ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 11.—The national prohibition convention devoted its entire session today in a wrangle over the report of the committee on organization and party work.

An attempt to have correspondence showing the attitude of the presidential candidates of the other parties incorporated in the proceedings was tabled. Attempts to force nominations at the morning session were spalled off by parliamentarians. Despite the protests of the leaders the convention recessed from 12:30 to 3:30.

coal lease from the Philadelphia and Reading Coal company for Frederick Warneke. It is charged that Warneke promised the judge \$500, and later a note for \$500 was discounted for the judge and has not yet matured.

Article 6.—That Judge Archbald used his influence to help Jas. R. Dainty of Scranton, Pa., purchase a coal tract from the Lehigh Valley railroad while the Lehigh had a suit before the commerce court.

"The persistency with which Judge Archbald sought these business favors or property concessions from railroads having litigation, or likely to have litigation before the commerce court indicates a well defined plan to use his official position and influence as a member of such court for financial gain and profit," says the committee.

Article 7.—That Judge Archbald figured as a signer and the payee of a note for \$2,500 by W. W. Reisinger of Scranton, Pa., five days after he had adjudicated an insurance lawsuit in which Reisinger was interested and a beneficiary.

Articles 8 and 9.—That Judge Archbald sent Edward J. Williams to Wm. F. Boland to discount a note for \$800 signed by John Henry Jones while the Bolands were interested in a lawsuit before him. Boland would not discount the note, which was discounted in a Scranton bank and never has been paid.

Articles 10 and 11.—That in the spring of 1910 Judge Archbald permitted Henry W. Cannon of New York to pay his entire expenses on a pleasure trip to Europe. Mr. Cannon was at that time, and still is, a stockholder and director in many railroads.

"It is claimed that Mr. Cannon is a distant relative of Judge Archbald's wife," said the committee, "but however this may be, your committee regards it as improper for a judge to thus obligate himself to an officer of numerous corporations likely to become directly or indirectly involved in litigation before his court."

For the same trip E. W. Searle, clerk of Judge Archbald's court, collected \$500 from attorneys practicing at that bar.

Article 12.—Appointed J. B. Woodward of Wilkesbarre, Pa., a railroad

attorney, as jury commissioner of his court. This was calculated to "bring the federal judiciary to 'diarepute,'" the committee said.

Move to Slough Building The new Slough building is now completed and ready for occupancy. It is to be occupied by the Whitman Drug company and Loewe Brothers, the tailors. They expect to begin moving this week, so as to be ready for business in the new location by the 15th of the month.

GOVERNOR HARMON TO VISIT IN CALIFORNIA

"You have my permission to announce that if my present plans do not miscarry, I shall visit California some time during the fore part of September.

"You may be certain that the wonders of your state and your city, and the magnificent exposition which you are to build, have not suffered any in their presentation by Mr. Herring, who, during your contest a year since, as well as in his interest today, displays all the loyalty and ardor of a Californian.

"The great commonwealth of Ohio has given 10,000 of her very best people to the citizenship of your state, and when I visit you, I shall feel as one who comes among his people, and I know that your expression will serve as a means of uniting more strongly the bonds of sympathy between your state and mine."
