

WILL HEAR THE TRUTH REGARDING THE COUNTRY

KLAMATH FALLS PEOPLE CAN
EXPECT TO HEAR A PLAIN
STATEMENT OF FACTS FROM
MEMBERS PORTLAND PARTY

The people of Klamath Falls can expect to hear a plain statement of facts and conditions as experienced by the Pathfinder party on their trip from Portland. Undoubtedly many things will be told, which, if taken advantage of by Klamath county, will result in great good to this section, and secure for this county the automobile travel from the north and the south. The Portland Journal has the following account of a meeting held at Burns:

"The pathfinder party on its way to Lakeview from Portland, which has been in and around Burns for the past few days, have been cordially received and featured. Accompanied by Burns Commercial Club members, the party has spent the time in touring the section of Harney county adjacent to Burns, and visiting farmers and ranchers. Talks have been made at several of the places by C. C. Chapman, as general booster, Phil S. Bates on his favorite subject, 'Good Roads,' and C. L. Smith, the O. W. R. & N. 'farmer'.

"Saturday night in Burns a booster meeting was held in Tonawana theater that filled the house. Judge Wm. Miller, president of the Burns Commercial Club, acted as chairman.

Chapman's Criticism of Burns

"C. C. Chapman is always received by Burns audiences royally. His remarks Saturday night more than heretofore were a frank criticism of some local conditions. After having explained the purpose of the trip, he called special attention to the part the Portland Automobile Club is taking in sending out the map making car equipped with engineer, surveyor, etc. to determine some feasible touring routes in interior Oregon, with a view of connecting up with the transcontinental touring route from New York to Portland to California points. He went so far as to say that the best route could be selected through the interior. A new car with special equipment arrived here from Bend for the trip Sunday. The car had duplicate parts for nearly every portion of the machine, a surveyor's outfit and equipment, so that danger of delay is minimized.

"Mr. Chapman frankly criticized the road between here and Bend as about the 'worst he had ever seen,' and 'didn't know whether sometimes on the way up he was going to the devil or Burns.' He said Harney county's part of the road was the worst. Crook county had signs and indices that were a great help to those traveling, while Harney county had nothing of the kind. Places for the accommodation of the traveling public should be provided, he said. He also criticized the Burns hotels, indicating that they would not do justice to towns half the size of Burns, with nothing like the business possibilities possessed here. He called attention to the fact that 'hotels are a city's front door,' and have much to do with impressions gained of a community. During Mr. Chapman's hotel criticisms Dell Wibbe, proprietor of the Burns hotel, left the audience.

"Phil S. Bates spoke a few remarks and insists, as he always does when here, that Harney county has with one exception the finest highways in Oregon, not excepting the Willamette Valley. C. L. Smith was new to a Burns audience, but 'made good.' He gave an address to the farmers that was practical, witty, humorous, critical, meaty and constantly instructive. Mr. Smith said this was the greatest undeveloped county he was ever in, with a soil of the finest possibilities, and that nowhere was there a more finely equipped experiment farm."

SEASON IS NOW OPEN FOR PRODUCTS EXHIBIT

FARMERS URGED TO PREPARE
EXHIBITS FOR THE FIRST PACIFIC
NORTHWEST SHOW IN
PORTLAND

PORTLAND, July 18.—This is the open season for exhibits.
"Everybody's doing it," when it comes to assembling Oregon products for shipment to Middle West land shows. The railways are at it, and the Portland Commercial Club is conducting a still-hunt of its own through the members of the Oregon Development League, to see that this state is represented at the expositions of soil products to be held next winter.

The Macedonian cry has gone out from the office of Secretary C. C. Chapman of the Oregon Development League at Portland, and the responses now being received are gratifying in the extreme. Splendid crop conditions throughout the state are helping this work, and it is safe to say that the samples of grains, grasses, vegetables and fruits will be of the best possible quality, and it is believed that Oregon will capture some notable prizes.

Pretty soon the Oregon farmer will be reminded to make exhibits in Portland, November 18-23, for this year the Pacific Northwest is to have a land products show of its own for the first time. Naturally, the farmers will take more interest in this than in the Eastern shows, but it is the hope of the commercial bodies that none of the land expositions will be overlooked. The fact is, that while these shows offer the best means of publicity, Oregon has largely overlooked this means of advertising in the past. It is hoped this year to get in line with the most progressive states of the Northwest in this particular.

Not only has Secretary Chapman sent out circular letters of instruction as to choosing and gathering exhibits, but the Great Northern Railway company, through E. C. Leedy, general immigration agent, is out with a circular giving detailed instructions as to collecting, curing and shipping exhibits. Anyone who wants information on this subject should communicate either with the Portland Commercial Club or the Great Northern railway or the Hariman lines for full instructions.

Frank Jack, who was arrested some time ago on a charge of selling liquor to an Indian on the Klamath reservation was arraigned in the federal court in Portland. He pleaded not guilty, and was held for trial.
