SIREN WHISTLE HEARD EARLY AT SHIPPINGTON

A test was made this afternoon with a siren whistle, which was attached to the compressed air storage tank at the Klamath Falls Iron works. The whistle could be heard all over the city, although it was only placed temporarily, and was alongside the plant building, which made an obstruction on one side. A telephone message was received a few minutes later from Shippington, which is nearly two miles away, to the effect that

the siren whistle was heard plainly there. The experiment demonstrated that the siren whistle is much more satisfactory than a bell would be, and is also cheaper. The committee appointed by the council was authorized to install a whistle for a fire alarm.

CRIMINAL CASE IS CONTINUED IN COURT

TRIAL OF GEORGE McLANE POSTPONED UNTIL FRIDAY—OTHER CASES WILL BE HEARD IN THE INTERIM

"The criminal cases," said Judge Baldwin this morning, "are the only ones that are giving me any anxiety. I would not hold a jury twenty-four hours on a civil case. If the attorneys are not ready the cases will have to go over. But in a criminal case the defendant has a right to a speedy trial."

The case of the state vs. Geo. McLane, charged with horse stealing, the animal being the property of Mr. H. A. Winnard of Langell Valley, was set for this morning, and the jurors were in attendance. Owing to the fact that the case could not be finished in one day, and that the attorneys in the case will be obliged to leave in the morning for Salem in the court house appeal case, it was continued until Friday morning.

This, however, was not the chief ground upon which Judge Benson granted the continuance. The prosecution intimated that two vital witnesses were absent, one named Campbell, who has been located in Prineville, and is now being sought by Deputy Sheriff Marion Barnes, who in his automobile is now at Lakeview. The other, a man named Dunan, is ill and under treatment in a Sacramento hospital, and has conveyed word to the prosecuting attorney that he will be ready to start for here in two or three days.

At first it was the disposition of the court to excuse the jurors until Friday morning, but on the assurance of Stone & Barrett, attorneys for the plaintiff, in the case of M. M. Obenchain against the Ransome Crummy company, that the case would be ready for trial tomorrow, it was set for the morning, and the jurors ordered to be in attendance. The plaintiff in this case claims to have expended about \$500 for the defendant corporation in paving and other work, that he was employed at \$150 a month, and that for his services there is due to him \$1,231.00.

Having made this arrangement for keeping the court in action, Judge Benson intimated that there would be no unusual delay in trying the criminal cases, of which three of them were set for the next two weeks, for he would not permit the time of jurors who come from long distances to be consumed unnecessarily, when they had interests to attend to in their respective homes.
