

CATTLE KILLED NEAR MIDLAND

FAILURE OF RAILROAD TO PROTECT RIGHT OF WAY CAUSES
HEAVY LOSSES TO THE STOCK
RAISERS IN THAT VICINITY

Numerous complaints have been made recently because of the number of cattle killed by the railroad in the vicinity of Midland, as a result of the right of way at that point not being fenced.

J. R. Dixon, democratic nominee for county commissioner, is the latest to complain. Monday he lost a young steer, killed by a train. A few days before a yearling roan heifer was struck near the same place by a train. Both front legs of the animal were broken. The owner of the heifer is not known.

Not long ago three cattle were killed in one day.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—A score of passengers, who arrived here today on the Pacific Mail liner Korea made depositions to the United States district attorney, John L. McNab, to the effect that gambling had been carried on during the entire trip across the Pacific.

Chinese members of the crew operated from eight to ten fan tan games on the main deck. Society women and notable men among the passengers played the limit. John N. Mills, a prominent business man of Evanston, Indiana, was the chief complainant.

District Attorney McNab is investigating.

ADY VICTOR IN CIRCUIT COURT

JURY FINDS THAT HE IS ENTITLED TO DAMAGES FOR \$41.50
FOR LAND HELD BY DEFENDANT, AUGUST LISKEY

A verdict for the plaintiff was returned in the circuit court this afternoon in the case of Abel Ady vs. August Liskey. This was a replevin suit involving the recovery of ten tons of hay. This property had been returned, however, prior to the trial of the case, and the jury only considered the question of damages as a result of the retention of the land. The sum of \$100 was asked.

The jury reported at 3:30 this afternoon, finding for the plaintiff in the sum of \$41.50, but each party to the action must bear his own costs.

A record in jury getting was made in this case, in which John Irwin appeared for Ady and J. S. Kent for Liskey.

Within ten minutes after the box was filled the lawyers had finished their examination of the list, and then the defense exercised one peremptory challenge, excusing W. P. McMillan. The court took a recess till 11 o'clock, while Sheriff Barnes went out to secure a special panel of five. R. H. Ross was accepted.

The jury was composed as follows: C. H. Kester, Edgar Virgil, Harry Wilson, J. R. Dixon, L. F. Willett, Frank Irish, W. S. Slough, Chas. Gray, Chas. Mack, Jesse Turner, S. B. Low and R. H. Ross.

The complete time consumed in securing the jury was fourteen minutes, which is phenomenal. Henry Anderson was examined as the only witness for the plaintiff, and the defendant, A. A. Liskey, was the only deponent for the defense. Judge Benson's instructions were brief, the case being given to the jury at 2:30. This marks an unprecedented record in the trial of a jury case, which it was arranged would be strenuously contested, in that the whole proceedings occupied but 44 minutes.

Hoyt Is Fined
George Hoyt, the prominent business man of Port Klamath, who was arrested Tuesday on a charge of selling spoiled meat, appeared before Justice Graves this morning and pleaded guilty. A fine of \$100 was imposed.

Jury Gets Heat
At the conclusion of the case of Ady vs. Liskey in the circuit court this afternoon, Judge Benson excused the jury until Friday morning at 9 o'clock.

DEER MOVING TO MOUNTAINS

GAMM WILL BE PLENTIFUL THIS
YEAR, AND WARDEN WARNS
HUNTERS NOT TO VIOLATE
THE LAW

Game Warden C. M. Ramsby and Henry Stout, who is assisting him, returned last evening from a trip into the mountains on the west side of Upper Lake. They expect to return either today or tomorrow.

Mr. Ramsby states that the deer are quite plentiful in the mountains this year, and from information he has received the woods will be full of hunters when the season opens the 1st of August. The deer, which come down into the low lands early in the spring, are beginning to move back into the mountains.

"You can say," said the game warden, "that it will be well for the hunters to be careful not to violate the deer law in regard to does, for if anybody is caught with a doe they need not be disappointed if they should have to return to Klamath Falls and make an explanation before the justice, because we want it distinctly understood that there is to be no violation permitted of the deer law, and want the assistance of all true sportsmen."

BERLIN BANK MESSENGERS GET AWAY WITH CASH

BERLIN, July 24.—Berlin banks and banking systems have received a rude shock by the disappearance of three bank messengers with \$25,000, \$30,000 and \$45,000 respectively. No one has so far been captured. Herr Haase, messenger for the American Express company, left with \$25,000. He was so successful that a few days later Leon Zebell, messenger for a private bank took \$30,000 of the bank's money with him. The latter's successful get-away inspired Gustav Brunning of the Dresdner bank to like efforts. He was sent to the Imperial bank for \$250,000, returned with it, and while part of it was being checked over walked out of the bank with \$45,000. He never came back.

JAPANESE EMPEROR MUCH BETTER TODAY

HOPE IS HELD OUT FOR HIS COMPLETE RECOVERY — PHYSICIANS SAY ROYAL PATIENT WILL BE OUT OF DANGER SOON

TOKIO, July 24.—An official bulletin issued this morning by the mikado's physicians say that the royal patient is much improved, and it is expected he will be out of all danger in three or four days.

The crown prince visited the sick room this morning. The mikado took half a pint of milk gruel and his diabetic condition was much improved.

LEVY'S LIFE ENDANGERED BY NOTORIOUS THUGS

POLICE SEND OUT CIRCULARS
DESCRIBING MEN WANTED FOR
MURDER OF ROSENTHAL, THE
GAMBLER, IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, July 24.—Circulars have been issued by the New York police asking for the arrest of "Whitely" Lewis, "Lefty" Lowe, Samuel Sheps, Harry Harowitz and "Dago" Frank, connected with the Rosenthal murder. This action followed Mrs. Rosenthal's testimony and dictagraphs taken of Shapiro and Libby conversations in the Tomb.

Justice Giegerich denied a writ of habeas corpus for "Bridle" Webber, and continued the hearing of the application of Sam Paul.

Counselor Levy, attorney for Libby and Shapiro, charged that an effort had been made last night to "get him." On returning to his home he found doors and windows open, showing marks of a jimmy having been used. He is confident that the assassins were responsible.

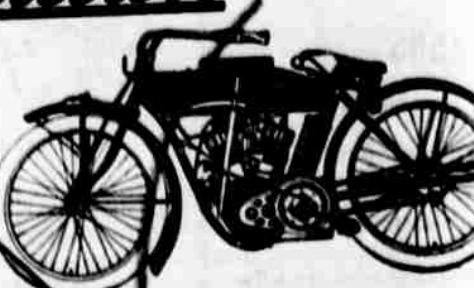
