WORMWOOD IS BARRED FROM MANY LANDS

SWITZERLAND FOLLOWS LEAD OF UNITED STATES AND PROHIBITS DRINKING OF DEADLY FRENCH CORDIAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—In ordering the exclusion from the United States of absinthe, the "green devil," the government is following the lead of Switzerland, which about a year ago decided to prohibit the drink, and also placed the ban on its manufacture. The agitation in Switzerland was widespread. The forces that opposed the prohibition law were also very active, because the suppression of the industry meant a big loss to them.

Now the pure food and drug board, through Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture, has issued an edict that no more absinthe shall be imported into this country after October 1st, and in a short time the treasury will make this effective by issuing specific orders to all collectors of customs and port officials that they shall allow no more absinthe to be imported after the date named by the pure food and drug board.

Very little agitation has been heard in Washington regarding absinthe. American drinkers never have taken kindly to the drug as a beverage, and the big temperance interests seem to have reserved their fire for alcoholic beverages, which are more popular.

Dairying Pays Penny
S. A. Penny, a Lost River farmer, was in the city today. He declares that dairying is proving profitable for him.

"Years ago, when I was tilling the soil exclusively, I had a hard time to make a living," said Mr. Penny, "but now that I am going in more for dairying money is a good deal easier."

LORIMER KEEPS A FRIEND IN A JOB

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—Former Solicitor General Lehman of the department of justice, is telling a story of how Former Senator Lorimer kept Lehman on the government payroll, although the Illinoisian could not stay there himself. For a week after Lehman resigned, Lorimer forced Lehman to hold his position and draw his salary, although Lehman was anxious to leave Washington.

Protraction of the Lorimer case in the Senate caused Lehman's troubles. Lehman turned in his resignation just about the time the Lorimer debate began in the senate. President Taft then appointed Solicitor General Bullitt of Kentucky to fill Lehman's place. By that time the Lorimer debate was in full swing. Lorimer himself took the floor for three days.

While the Lorimer case had the right of way in the senate, Bullitt's nomination could not be confirmed by the senate. For a solid week Lehman sat anxiously in the senate gallery, listening to the Lorimer debate, and "rooting" for its finish, so that Bullitt could be confirmed.

CHINAMEN DO THEIR OWN BARBER WORK

Edict Ordering Queues Cut Off Upsets the Market for Barber Supplies. Japs Sell Safety Razors for Forty-Six Cents Each

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—Consul C. L. L. Williams, from Shanghai, China, sends in word that the recent edict in China which commands that all queues be severed has rather upset the market in that country for barbers' supplies. There is somewhat of a tendency to do away with barbers altogether, although the barbers, the consul adds, never did thrive particularly well. Itinerants were the rule, rather than the exception, tonsorial artists who carried their kits about with them, and who never went to the trouble of establishing permanent stands.

A good many families now consider that a hair clipper, which costs about \$1.35, is all that is necessary. The outlook for the sale of razors is very poor, the consul reports, since the custom of shaving the head has given place to home hair cutting. The Japanese have entered the field, and are retailing a safety razor for about 46 cents, American money.
