Editor Evening Herald:

You have published the argument of the Equal Taxation League against the graduated single tax. Perhaps you will be good enough to consider a few points on the other side.

The graduated single tax amendment is very far from being "a single tax measure, pure and simple," but as the single tax system is new in the United States, although the idea had its birth in California, it is not to be expected that more than a limited measure can be obtained at once, it is, therefore, better that the large land speculator should bear the greater burden at the start, since it is not a tax on his industry, but on the special privilege which he holds.

The amendment, if adopted, will tax for state purposes values in excess of \$10,000, while it will exempt from taxation all forms of personal property and improvements on land in the several counties of Oregon. It will place the burden of taxation on land values, not on land. The farmer, workingman and merchant are proportionately small owners of land values, and, therefore, would pay a proportionately small tax, and as land value is due to the growth of the community, not to their industrial effort, the tax will not be a burden on their industry.

Economic land value is the result of the centralization of population and the economies due thereto, and cannot in any way be lessened or destroyed by taxing it, but speculative land value, the economic value of the future, what the speculator expects to sweat out of the industry of others in anticipation of the further increase of population, may disappear entirely if the tax is high enough. The fact that the ultimate single tax will destroy land speculation is one of the strongest arguments in its favor. Land speculation is the bane of industry. It diverts useful effort from its natural channel, and creates a class that to the extent it is engaged in land speculation absorbs the results of the labor of others. Excessive land value paralyzes business, since the capital that is held up to pay for the land, either as purchase price or rent, necessarily reduces by that amount the capital available for carrying on the business, and the owner of the land gives absolutely no return whatever in products of his industry for the consideration received.

A shrinkage in speculative land value will therefore stimulate business in all its branches, and give to labor a just return for its industry.

The measure to be voted on by the people in November will go far to eliminate land speculation, but how this is going to paralyze trade and commerce the Equal Taxation League may enlighten the "intelligent voters" later on. When it does so it might tell the intelligent farmer from what source besides his labor he now receives pay. It may be somewhat difficult to convince him that he even receives pay for his labor, whether he gets a good crop or not. It would also be interesting to know what provision the present system of taxation makes for him if he does not get a good crop.

The single tax system will not insure the farmer a good crop. For that he will have to look to a higher source, but it will insure him exemption from taxation of any and all crops. It will tax only the unimproved land value, which is small in proportion to his improvements and personal property. It will not confiscate the land, but, reducing the taxes by increasing the number of users through decreasing the number of non-using holders, will place the occupier in greater security in the possession of his land, whether it be a farm or city lot, and at the same time secure to him the fruits of his labor.

One of the greatest inducements offered to prospective settlers of Oregon is the cheapness of land. If the proposed amendment will make it cheaper let every commercial body in Oregon boost for its adoption.
