CLIP THE WINGS OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS

Attorney General Makes a Decision
That Will Do Away With a Great
Deal of Delay in Matters Pertaining
to Pure Food and Drugs

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—

The wings of the so-called pure food
and drugs board of appeals have been
greatly clipped by a recent decision of
the attorney general, which holds that
it has no power to revoke or modify
any findings of fact of the department
of agriculture in these matters.

This means that hereafter when
the department promulgates an order
relating to food or drugs the three
secretaries of the treasury, commerce
and labor and agriculture, constitut-
ing the board, it becomes final, and
the triple-headed commission's power
is confined to enacting rules and regu-
lations to carry out the order—if
that be necessary.

When the saccharine case came up
before this board on a complaint from
food manufacturers that the bureau
of chemistry had been unfair to them,
the board had what amounted to a
rehearing of the whole case. As a
result the saccharine ruling did not
go into effect for a long time.

When Dr. Wiley's ruling in the mis-
branded grain case excited contro-
versy, the board also stepped in and
gave the grain dealers a hearing.

Recently the department of agricul-
ture announced that all importations
of absinthe would be barred from the
United States after October 1st, on
the ground that it is a deleterious
substance, and dangerous to the pub-
lic health. If the importers of ab-
sinthe want any relief they will have
to appeal to the courts. They won't
be able to get it from the appeal
board.

IS YOUR NAME IN THE SECRETARY'S BOOK?

If It Isn't, and You Want to Get It
There All You Have to Do Is to
Call on Secretary MacVeagh, and
Mr. Taylor Will Do the Rest

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—

No matter who you are, whether sen-
ator, congressman, bricklayer, busi-
ness man, or just an ordinary re-
porter, every time that you call on
Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh
your name goes down in a little book
and is made a part of a permanent
record. If the secretary wants to
know who called on him a year ago
he can look in this little book and
find out. If there is any dispute about
it the little book will tell.

The idea is a pet one of Francis
Taylor, private secretary to the secre-
tary. Every time a man goes to see
the secretary, Mr. Taylor gets his
name, and, if he is an out-of-town
man, his business. It requires a good
deal of hustling on Mr. Taylor's part,
but he gets away with the job very
handily. Some times a group of six
or seven persons, or maybe twenty,
arrive to see the secretary at once.
This doesn't worry Taylor. He gets
them all, just the same.

The record served the secretary
very usefully recently in a contro-
versy which he had with one of the
assistant secretaries who resigned.
The assistant claimed that since his
services in the treasury, or a large
part of the time, he had been unable
to get an interview with the secretary.
The record showed that during a cer-
tain period in dispute the assistant
secretary had twenty-one audiences
with his chief.
