

BARROW ON STAND TELLS OF TREACHERY

HARRINGTON WAS MY WHO GAVE PROSECUTION INFORMATION CONCERNING DEFENSE OF McNAMARA BROTHERS

LOS ANGELES, July 31.—When Clarence Barrow took the stand this morning he told of Harrington staying at his house in November, and at the same time visiting Attorney Lawler every day, telling him all he knew of the conduct of the McNamara case and of the witness. This closed the direct examination. Several jurors asked minor questions, then the cross examination started.

Interest in the trial is intense. Women stood for hours in line before the court opened. Scores of them became tired and sat on the cement floors of the hall of justice waiting for the doors to open.

HIGH COST OF LIVING MIGHT BE THE CAUSE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—Maybe it's the high cost of living—but, anyway, Americans aren't drinking as much champagne as they were wont to in the olden days.

A special report from Consul Barde, at Rheims, France, just made public by the bureau of manufactures, shows that while the 1911-1912 sales from the champagne district to the United States were a large increase over the year previous, still the total isn't nearly as much as in the years previous.

In 1911-1912 France disposed of 2,775,424 quart bottles of "grape" to the United States. The year previous the total was only 1,951,316 bottles. But in 1909 it reached the big total of 5,420,316—the most wine sent to the United States in ten years.

The consular official estimates that the "decrease is due to higher prices for champagne in France, as also with the increase in United States customs duties on sparkling wines."

LAWYERS FAVOR KLAMATH FALLS

Mr. and Mrs. Conner are loyal to Klamath, and express their surprise and delight at the signs of improvement on every side in this section of the country, and especially with the improved conditions of the roads. They say there are a few million roads, though, in the Ashland road that ought to be moved.

MOTOR CYCLE LAW IS BEING ENFORCED

C. B. Coon was arrested last night for running his motor cycle without a light, and today paid a fine of \$5. Chief of Police Smith states that all owners of motor cycles will be compelled to observe the state law in regard to licenses, number plates and lights, and that the law is to be strictly enforced, the same as with automobiles.

SENATOR BOURNE WILL NOT RUN INDEPENDENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—Senator Bourne, replying to letters urging him to be a candidate for reelection, many of which have been received by him, writes that he appreciates the evidence of good will and confidence, but would consider it a reflection on the primary system of Oregon to become a candidate for the senate unless Ben Seiling's nomination should be declared fraudulent. Initiative in determining this, as well as in placing his name before the people, would have to come, he says, from others than himself. After adjournment Senator Bourne will visit Oregon.

young fish in transit has been negligible, but a man has to stay with them all the time until they are released in the water. Changing the water, keeping it cool and preventing severe jolting requires a man's time. By the time that we get a batch delivered and we are relieved of the responsibility, we usually collapse, and drop down to sleep right on the spot for several hours.

"Some of the trips that we make into the Cascades are certainly worth the money. The last time I was out I crossed a snowfield in a canyon which must have been 400 or 500 feet deep, as best I could judge from the contour of the ground near.

"We will soon start work from behind Bend, reaching a series of lakes on that side of the range. That is said to be a truly wonderful country also, in which game probably is more plentiful than elsewhere in the Northwest, because of the comparatively inaccessible character of the country."

KLAMATH COUNTY CROPS ARE ABUNDANT IN 1912

THE RECLAMATION SERVICE REPORTS GRAIN ON DRY LANDS LOOK AS GOOD AS THAT UNDER THE CANALS

The United States reclamation service has taken official notice of the prospects for bumper crops in the Klamath country. In the official publication of the service, the Reclamation Record, it is announced that the crops on the dry ranches look as good as those under the irrigation ditches.

The report of the work on the Klamath project follows:

Oregon-California Project (71 per cent completed).—Cool and cloudy weather continued throughout the greater part of the month. An abnormal amount of rain fell, and there were several severe hail storms, but little damage was done to growing crops. Grain fields on the dry ranches look as flourishing as those under the canals, and all indications point to heavy yields. All of the canals and principal laterals were operated throughout the month, an average of 300 second feet being diverted through the main canal for irrigation. Authority was received to proceed with the construction work on the second unit laterals and preliminary work was commenced. Finishing work at the Lost River dam was continued. The diversion channel was operated continuously, carrying an average discharge of 150 second feet.

ELKS' LODGE IS IN FINANCIAL LUXURY

The Grand Lodge of Elks has issued a report to the local lodge, showing the financial standing of the order. This report is very satisfactory.

The property owned by the subordinate lodges of the order on March 31, 1912, aggregated in value \$20,391,832.45. Portland Lodge No. 142 of Portland, Ore., is the richest lodge, with property valued at \$345,684. New York Lodge No. 1 is second, with assets of \$35,700. There are twenty-one lodges in the order worth over \$100,000 each, Spokane lodge standing eighth on the list.

The membership of the order is making a net increase of over 2,000 per month, and the expenditures for charitable and beneficent purposes exceed \$1,000,000 annually. The Grand Lodge voted \$20,000 to be used in the war on tuberculosis in the United States.

CONVICTS TAKE LEAVE OF JAIL

FOUR DESPERATE CRIMINALS ARE BELIEVED TO HAVE ESCAPED FROM NEVADA BY WAY OF SOUTHERN OREGON

Local officers have been advised to be on the lookout for a quartet of convicts who have escaped at different times during the past two months from the Nevada penitentiary.

The latest convict to leave prison without permission was Riley Wooten, who killed a deputy sheriff. He was taken to the penitentiary in chains, as he was believed to be one of the most desperate criminals in the country.

Warden Cowing, who succeeded Warden Baker, placed Wooten on his honor, and put him to work on the chain gang. No trace of Wooten has been found. This makes the fourth prisoner to escape since Cowing took charge, four months ago.

ELECTRICITY USED TO CALM AIR WAVES

MINEOLA, N. Y., July 31.—A series of experiments is to be undertaken on the aviation field here this week, which may mark a notable advance in the conquest of the air.

Experts from the signal corps of the state national guard will try out a new device for calming the air waves in the immediate vicinity of a flying aeroplane by means of wireless transmission of electricity. The theory is that the wireless will control the air currents in much the same way as oil poured on a storm-tossed sea stills the troubled waters.

PICNICKERS TO CHARTER BOAT

Tomorrow the steamer Winema will be under the control of the Methodist Sunday school. The scholars and their friends have chartered the vessel, and will go on a general picnic to Rocky Point and Harriman Lodge.

It is announced that there will be no charge for children and only a nominal fee for adults. It is not an invitation affair, but anyone who cares to make the trip may do so.

SENATE REFUSES TAFT'S VETO BILL

REIMBURSEMENT ACT IS PASSED BY OVERWHELMING VOTE AND AFTER TAFT HAD REFUSED TO SANCTION THE MEASURE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—The senate by a vote of 42 to 17 overturned President Taft's veto of the reimbursement bill in favor of the sub-contractors on the Shoshone irrigation project in Wyoming. The measure was repassed.

This is the first time that President Taft's veto has been overridden. The measure now goes to the house.

McLEAN WILL GO TO JAIL

George McLean will probably not appeal his case to the supreme court, but will accept the sentence which will be imposed by Judge Benson tomorrow morning. W. H. Shaw, his attorney, stated that no definite decision had been reached, but he considered it improbable that an appeal would be taken.

There was a rumor current on the streets last night to the effect that there would follow other arrests in connection with the theft of horses recently in Langell valley. This could not be substantiated, however, and it is believed that unless there are some new complaints, no more arrests will be made.

Most of the witnesses who have been here attending the McLean trial left for home this morning.
