

MANY BERRIES READY TO PICK

REPORTS FROM HUCKLEBERRY PATCH IN VICINITY OF LAKE OF THE WOODS ARE THAT THIS SEASON IS EXCEPTIONAL

Huckleberries are more plentiful in the Lake of the Woods country this year than ever before.

This is the word brought here by L. Crisman and Tom Powers, who have just returned from the famous berry patch. Mr. Powers has annually made trips to that section for a number of years. He declares that never has he seen the berries so plentiful.

Berries Are Ripening

The berries are now ripening, and there are many people from this city who are preparing to start for the patch in a few days for their winter supply of the toothsome berry. It is expected that there will be more people than ever before come over from Medford and Willamette Valley towns on berrying trips. The famous berry patch is located about fourteen miles from Odessa, and is accessible to people living along the main line of the Southern Pacific, as well as residents of the Klamath country.

considered by the jury, as fairly, in fact, as any case that has come under my observation.

"It is the age of the defendant that speaks loudly against a parole. If he were a young man, and had committed a crime on the impulse of the moment, there might be some reason for granting a parole. Then there

might be some assurance to the court that the crime was but a slip, and would not be repeated. But when a man of 50 years has deliberately committed an offense, there is little assurance that the parole will not be violated.

"Under these circumstances, the court is not willing to grant a parole." An indeterminate sentence of from one to ten years was then imposed, and the state given judgment against the prisoner for the costs of the case. McLean took his sentence calmly. As soon as the court left the room the prisoner smiled broadly, and discussed with Sheriff Barnes the trip to Salem. He will be taken to the state penitentiary tomorrow.

DUN AGENCY REPORTS INDICATE PROSPERITY

REVIEW OF CONDITIONS IN THE NORTHWEST INDICATE SEASON IS PROSPEROUS AND HARD TIMES FAR DISTANT

Prosperity for this year in the Northwest measured only by the million unit of increase over the preceding year, is announced by R. G. Dun & Co. in a semi-annual review of conditions. This statement makes the strongest showing for a great business season the ensuing six months that has yet been compiled.

Oregon, Washington and Idaho are forecasted to harvest 75,000,000 bushels of wheat, against 64,000,000 last year; 12,300,000 bushels of oats, as against 10,750,000 last year, and 33,000,000 bushels of barley, against 26,750,000 last year.

Hops for Oregon and Washington are put at 130,000 bales, as compared to 94,000 bales last year. Wool and mohair in the three states last year yielded \$7,814,000, whereas \$8,363,000 is in sight already for 1912. The fruit crop for the three states is put at \$19,970,000 for 1912, as against \$13,919,000 the preceding season.

CLEMENTS IS NOT FAVORED

RULINGS OF COURT ARE AGAINST THE MAN WHO IS BEING TRIED FOR KILLING THE SLAYER OF HIS MOTHER

REDDING, Calif., Aug. 1.—The preliminary hearing of William Clements, charged with the murder of ex-Mayor Landis, who had killed Clements' mother, will be concluded late this afternoon. Judge Donnelly ruled against the defense at every point.

The objection to the admission of Clements' confession was overruled by the bench. This confession states that Thompson and Griffith, who were arrested, but later released, were not concerned in the killing of Landis. Clements said they did not know of the plan to kill Landis.

DELEGATES WILL HAVE CHOICE OF THREE ROUTES

TRIP TO LAKEVIEW INCLUDES KLAMATH FALLS

Portland Commercial Club Issues Circulars Describing the Routes and Terms for Trip to Meeting of Central Oregon Development League at Lakeview—Inquiries for Reservations Pouring In

PORTLAND, Aug. 1.—Manager C. C. Chapman of the promotion department of the Portland Commercial Club, says there is an enormous inquiry for reservations for the auto trip to Lakeview and through Central Oregon, the details for which have just been outlined.

"We issued circulars yesterday afternoon," said Mr. Chapman, "and this morning our office force was busy answering telephone calls. There is no limit placed on the number that can be taken, and I look for the largest excursion of the kind ever arranged under the auspices of the club."

"The circular sent out gives the routes and terms, and I don't think anything more attractive was ever offered. To make either of those trips will be not only interesting, but tremendously instructive as well, for it will give first hand information about the wonderful interior of the state."

"The rates have been made as reasonable as possible, and the service will be the very best. No effort will be spared to make the excursion the most successful ever undertaken in the state. It will be novel, too, in that the greater interest will be made by auto."

Lakeview is the objective point of the four routes, and there the travelers will meet people from all parts of the state attending the annual meeting of the Central Oregon Development League, which is a very important part of the Oregon Development League. claim that a larger area of fruit lands exist than we have been given credit for.

"Several years ago, at the request of the state board of horticulture, I made a careful estimate of the acreage of land in this county that in my opinion was adapted to fruit growing, and I placed the acreage at 24,000 acres above the gravity ditches then surveyed, and 6,000 acres below. I do not believe I over-estimated the amount, and believe that time will show that there are even more acres of fruit land.

"Our foot hills and bench lands on the south, east and west contain more than the 24,000 acres estimated. True, they are in small tracts, but plenty large enough for fruit growing. The soil of these foot hills is unusually deep, rich and well drained, easily cultivated and kept in a condition to retain the moisture.

Land Easily Cleared

"The native growth of brush is far easier cleared than the fruit land of Western Oregon, and it will be found that these lands are especially adapted to fruit growing. It is a mistake to think that it is necessary to irrigate for fruit trees. Proper tillage will conserve enough moisture for all fruit except berries, which require an abundance of water to get good results. But it is unwise for anyone to attempt fruit growing who is either ignorant of the business or unwilling to devote time and attention to his orchard."

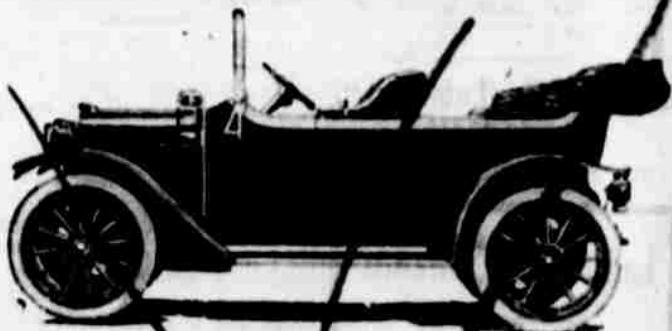
