

SOONER METHODS ARE EXPOSED

NEW ARRIVAL FROM SOUTH DAKOTA IS WARNED AWAY AT THE POINT OF A GUN—PAWN KILLED

Gold Hill, Ore.—By taking a short cut into town along the same creek trail two days before the opening of the season for deer. Paul Brosius, a new comer from South Dakota, was enabled to learn something of the methods of the Southern Oregon "sooner" or poacher. He had not gone far when he heard a rifle shot. He thought nothing of it until, a few minutes later he came upon a spotted fawn lying by the trail in a pool of fresh blood. A small round hole on one side and a gaping wound on the other showed how it came to its end. Brosius thought of the rifle shot, but his wonder as to who would shoot a fawn, and out of season at that, was cut short by a sharp command to move on, accompanied by the profane information that he (Brosius) had no business that should detain him in that particular locality.

Brosius at once continued his journey, noticing only that the command to move came from a man standing not more than thirty feet away, partly hidden by a tree, and that the man was covering him with a rifle.

Brosius had taken the trail, not only because it was a short cut to town, without the heat and dust of the highway, but because, being a nature lover, he had hoped to surprise some of the creatures of the woods in their native haunts. His expectations were more nearly fulfilled a short distance beyond the place he encountered the fawn and its slayer. A six-point buck pranced along the trail ahead of him for several hundred yards, pausing at intervals to look back before he finally disappeared in the woods.

Deputy Game Warden Sandry was informed of Brosius' experience, but as yet no clue to the identity of the outlaw who killed the spotted fawn has been found.

The proposal of the council to cut the salaries of the police force to less than living wage and turn the money thus saved over to the Northwestern as a bonus for doing the city advertising has aroused the taxpayers to a point of actual rebellion, and Mr. Smith has been commended on all sides for the action he has taken to expose the methods of the ringsters.

In the trial of the suit now pending facts will be brought out which will make clear the fallacy of the contention of the five councilmen and the newspaper which they are backing in its effort to rob the city.

The charge that Mr. Smith had declined to state the circulation of the Herald is absolutely unfounded. In fact, Mr. Smith courts the fullest publicity. This is evidenced by his action in carrying the matter into the courts. Whether or not the Northwestern prints 1400 or 14,000 papers daily affects the proposition not in the least. It is the number of papers circulated to bona fide subscribers within the limits of the city of Klamath Falls that should make any difference.

A meeting of the local sportsmen was held this afternoon in the office of Fish and Game Commissioner C. F. Stone, when arrangements were made for the distribution of the 118 cans of fingerling trout which are to arrive here on the 8:45 train. It was decided to take the fish out to the streams tonight. There were present at the meeting Mr. Stone, A. D. Miller, C. M. Ramsey, F. H. Mills, Robt. Hunsaker, J. B. Chambers, W. D. Innes, C. H. Daggett, Henry Stout, Chas. I. Roberts and R. C. Spink.

The trout are to be distributed by the following: C. I. Roberts, A. D. Miller, George Biehn and Frank Ankeny will go to Lost River; Fred Mills to Spencer Creek; J. B. Chambers to Clover Creek; and C. H. Daggett and Henry Stout to Rock Creek. The balance of the trout will be taken up the lake on the boat "Oakland," furnished by W. P. Johnson. At the Agency Landing twenty-five cans will be left for Spring Creek, and R. C. Spink will deliver these by wagon. Trout will also be left for Wood River

to be distributed by Jas. Felton and Lindsay Sisemore. Several cans will be taken to Crystal Creek from Pelican Bay by R. St. Geo. Bishop.

Eighteen cans of the shipment are for the forest supervisor, and will be placed in Four-Mile Creek.

In addition to the above, it is expected to secure other machines to assist in distributing the trout before evening, as there were a number of sportsmen who volunteered to help out, but could not be present at the meeting.

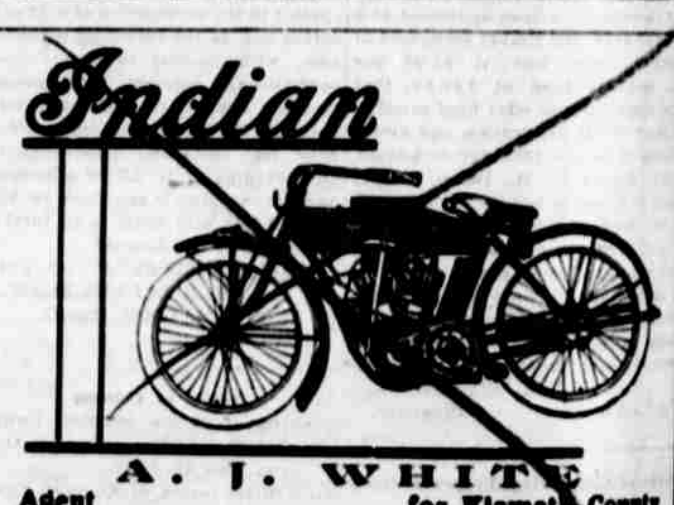
