CONGRESS DONE MIDDLE MONTH

LEADERS OF BOTH HOUSES GET TOGETHER ON DATE OF CLOSING OF LEGISLATIVE OPERATIONS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5.—Discussing the canal bill, the senate adopted amendments regarding the prohibition against American registration for foreign built ships for foreign trade, but these will not be permitted to carry foreign mail. The amendment also exempts from tolls all American registered vessels in foreign trade in the event that owners will agree to allow the United States government the use of the vessels in time of war.

Leaders of both houses of congress have fixed the time of adjournment at August 17th. It is expected that the senate will complete the consideration of the Panama canal bill today, following last night's action approving the free passage of American vessels by a vote of 44 to 11.

The only stumbling block for the bill now is the senate amendment permitting railroad owned vessels free use of the waterway. The house has prohibited the passage of such boats.

TRACK LAYING TO BE RUSHED

HARRIMAN LINE WILL BE EXTENDED ACROSS THE STATE AS RAPIDLY AS POSSIBLE—MANY MEN ARE WORKING

PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—"You can say it as strongly as you like that the line which the Harriman interests are throwing across the state from the eastern boundary westward will be the double track of that system between Portland and the Oregon Short Line, and that the line will be completed all the way across the state with the same speed that the work is now being prosecuted in the Malheur Canyon."

This statement was made by W. P. Davidson, president of the Oregon & Western Colonization company, who has arrived from St. Paul to inaugurate the most comprehensive immigration and colonization campaign ever undertaken in the state.

The Union Pacific has more than 4,000 men at work now in pushing the line forward from the Short Line junction at Vale, and is centering its construction efforts now on the big tunnel through Malheur Canyon, three-quarters of a mile long, and being driven through solid rock. A considerable stretch of track has been laid, and I have it from the best of authority that the Union Pacific intends to continue its line straight across the state to a connection with the Deschutes line at Bend, and that this new line will be the second track of the through system from Portland to Omaha.

STATE PEN IS NOW IN CLEAR

INSTEAD OF RUNNING BEHIND PRISON IS NOW KEEPING WITHIN LIMITS AND IS CLEAR FINANCIALLY

SALEM, Aug. 5.—That the penitentiary is now clear with the world from a financial point of view, and that he will be able to pull it through without a deficiency, was the declaration made by Governor West. When he discharged Superintendent C. W. James and relieved other employees of their positions, the institution, he

says, was running behind at the rate of \$700 a month. Economizing in all directions was the only way, he states, by which a deficiency at the institution could be avoided.

HIM HOUSE MAD, MAYN STATE BOARD

SALEM, Aug. 5.—The state board of health has condemned the hog house at the state asylum for the insane. Superintendent Steiner has been notified that the house must be put in a sanitary condition or be abolished within thirty days.

During the last session of the legislature Superintendent Steiner called the attention of the law makers to the great need of an adequate hog house for the insane asylum, and asked for an appropriation for erecting such a building. His request was turned down.
