EVANS REFUSES TO DO DUTY

THE HERALD will have to worry along without the aid of Sam Evans in the campaign for a clean city government. The editor of the Northwestern has declined an invitation to help in the shutting down of graft in the municipal government. It appears that things are moving along just about as Mr. Evans would have them, and the fact that the grand jury will shortly investigate the charges made by The Herald carries no weight with Mr. Evans.

Fortunately The Herald is able to conduct the battle of the people without the aid of Mr. Evans or the Northwestern. Fair minded citizens are rallying to the support of The Herald, and Mr. Evans will not be able to divert the attention of the public from the rotten condition of affairs which appears to exist.

Mr. Evans' long connection with an Espee-owned magazine appears to have perverted his ideas of the ethics of an honest newspaper. He has lined himself up on the side of suppression, and instead of joining The Herald in an honest campaign against graft, he has resorted to the very thing he has wanted so much white paper in condemning, "billingsgate."

In a long-winded editorial, Mr. Evans has taken occasion to abuse the editor and proprietor of The Herald. Mr. Evans declares that W. O. Smith's hands are rotten with graft. No doubt Mr. Evans, if he is the great newspaper man he appears to believe himself to be, has proof of the charges he makes against the editor of The Herald. He may need it.

Does Mr. Evans think that he can retain the respect and confidence of the people of Klamath Falls by his refusal to do his duty to the honest people, from whom he is receiving support, by assisting in protecting them from the machinations of corrupt politicians? Mr. Evans denies any knowledge of any graft, when the facts are given to him and are accessible to any person who desires to take the trouble of securing them. Yet he says:

"Maybe it would not be best for everybody concerned that all the facts about the alleged graft in the transfer of a certain saloon license be made public. Maybe the names of some persons now resting in fancied security behind the excretions of the cuttle fish would be brought into unpleasant notoriety."

Does the above sound as if Mr. Evans did not have some knowledge of what he was talking about?

ABOUT CIRCULATION

THE Northwestern appears to be able to manufacture circulation at will, as witness the last two affidavits of Mr. Evans.

Mr. Evans takes oath "that the number of papers of the issue of August 8 to be printed and circulated to bona fide subscribers to said newspaper is 1300." He certifies on oath "that the number of papers of the issue of August 9 to be printed and circulated to bona fide subscribers to said newspaper, is 1460."

According to the oath of Mr. Evans the Northwestern must have received 160 actual bona fide subscribers in a period of twenty-four hours. The public is naturally suspicious of fairy tales, even when accompanied by a sworn statement, and we would suggest that he print the names of these 160 new subscribers secured overnight, and tell the public who is paying for them.

"MOONSHINERS" TO HAVE PEACE

LACK OF FUNDS WITHDRAWS RAIDERS FROM THE PICTURE

INSURE FASTNESS OF THE AP-PALACHIANS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Moonshiners and other violators of the internal revenue law in the Carolinas, Kentucky, West Virginia and other mountain states of the Appalachian region, where the picturesque stories of present day romance hold forth, have gained temporary immunity from the revenue officers, through a lack of departmental appropriations. Homemade stills are still running along undisturbed in many a mountain fastness, while alert owners and operators, made doubly vigilant by the apparent disregard of the hated "revenuers," are pacing in nervous uneasiness at the unusual quiet and peace of their lives.

Forty raiders of the internal revenue service, brave men, renowned for their daring and efficiency, have been called from the hunt, because there are no funds. These forty men are all being assigned to other work, and moonshiners have gained temporary immunity.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue Cabell said today, however, that no violator would escape punishment, and that they would all be caught later.

HE MUST WORK WITHOUT PAY

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE GIVES OPINION THAT IT IS INCUMBERT UPON SHERIFFS TO SERVE PAPERS SENT THEM

SALEM, Aug. 9.—That is the incumbert upon the sheriff of one county to serve papers in criminal cases when forwarded to him from the sheriff of another county, and that he is not entitled to either expenses or remuneration for his services, is the substance of an opinion rendered by the attorney general's office at the request of W. B. Snider, sheriff of Lake county.

Sheriff W. B. Snider, after serving papers in a criminal case for the sheriff of Crook county, forwarded a claim for expenses and remuneration, and it was not honored by that county, the county commissioners maintaining that if any one was liable, it was the state. An investigation of the law, it is held, discloses that neither the county for which the papers are served nor the state is liable, and that despite this, under the law, the sheriff must work without pay.

ITALY'S FAMOUS CARRAR MARBLE

LABORERS IN QUARRIES RECEIVE MISERABLE PAY, AND THE METHODS USED ARE EXTREMELY CRUDE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—An interesting description of the world-famous Carrara marble of Italy is given in a report by Consular Agent Felix A. Delmas, who is stationed at Carrara. What he says on the subject of wages, however, gives no reason for congratulation to the poorly paid employees who have to do with Carrara marble. Delmas says the daily wages, which have been slightly increased within the last few years, are: Quarrymen, 45 cents to \$1.93; mill operators, 45 cents to \$1.15; marble cutters, 38 to 57 cents; studio workers and sculptors, 45 cents to \$2.31, and boys, 19 to 38 cents.

"Contrary to general belief," Delmas reports, "the Carrara mountains or Apuan Alps, are not composed entirely of marble, although deposits occur in sections parallel with the coast for forty miles. The jagged, rough, precipitous character of the Apuan Alps and the peculiar geological formations of the deposit, which can be expressively likened to a tortuous, broken puzzle, difficult of access, account in a great measure for the slow and unique manner in which the Carrara industry has developed as compared with the marble industry of America.

"With no other tools than sledge and wedge, the Etruscans, two or three centuries before the Christian era, split the marble from the low, outcropping strata by main force. They were followed by the Romans, who continued the industry intermittently until the fall of their empire. After that the quarries were probably forgotten. For centuries, so far as is known, no marble was quarried. With the religious awakening and fervor of the eleventh and twelfth centuries, a great demand for marble was created, which, followed by the artistic activity of the fifteenth century, gave the industry an impetus which has lasted to the present time."

VICTIM OF ALLEGED SWINDLE SUES SHOW

Confidence Men Fleeced Elderly Dallas Man of \$1,500—Claims They Were Connected With Kit Carson Wild West Show, and Sues Concern

Alleging that he is a victim of a confidence game to the extent of \$1,500, Bernhard Friesen of Dallas has instituted suit in the circuit court at Dallas against the Kit Carson Wild West Show to recover that amount.

Friesen is an elderly man, and says he was approached by confidence men in Dallas and prevailed upon to invest \$1,500 to be used in financing an electric belt company. The two confidence men asked to be furnished with \$1,500, and, being impressed with their scheme, Friesen went to the bank and drew the necessary money.

After the capital was secured the three men met and organized the company, and one of the confidence men was elected treasurer, and took the money. Finding that he had been fleeced, Friesen complained to the management of the circus, with the result that he was paid \$400, so says, and now he wants the rest of his capital, \$1,100.
