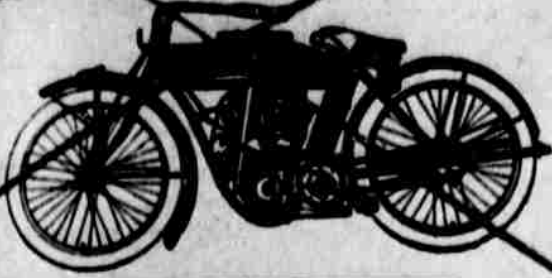

searching for a Stradivarius violin
valued at \$15,000, lost on a suburban
train by Herr Bergowitz, who is a
violinist, and who left the instrument
on his seat and walked out of the
car. When the train was searched
the violin had disappeared. In the
violin case Bergowitz also left \$500.
The violin dates from 1713, and is
one of the few genuine Strads in ex-
istence.
