ONLY PARTLY ASSEMBLES FOR
WEEK TRIP, WHICH IS TO A
DEFEAT

When Caleb T. Oliver's baseball
team planned to go to Weed Sunday

Fort Klamath cohorts to show up at

ESCAPE FROM MOVING TRAIN

DESPERATE HIGHWAYMEN BEAT
SHERIFF AND FIGHT TRAIN
CREW WITH STOLEN REVOLV-
ERS AND DROP FROM TRAIN

MOJAVE, Calif., Aug. 12.—After
a desperate battle on a Southern Pa-
cific passenger train between Mojave
and Beaville, Chris and Charles
White, alleged highway robbers, es-
caped from Deputy Sheriff Gates of
Los Angeles county, after beating
him almost unconscious with his own
revolver, and then exchanging a fusil-
ade of shots with the train crew.

The prisoners, although manacled
together, raised a vestibule platform
and dropped from the train, which
was running thirty-five miles an hour.
Gates left the train and, unaccom-
panied, is on the men's trail. A posse
from Mojave is being organized to
follow. One of the prisoners is be-
lieved to be seriously wounded.

The Whites are wanted in Los
Angeles to answer a charge of high-
way robbery. They had been cap-
tured at Bakersfield, and were being
taken to Los Angeles.
