Pastor of Angel City's Fellowship Heads Organization Against Capital Punishment and Deportation Coming Execution of Seven Prisoners.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—Dr. Reynolds Blight, pastor of the Los Angeles Fellowship and head of an organization opposed to capital punishment, declares the execution of seven condemned murderers at Sing Sing prison in New York, to be a crime against science and civilization.

"It was a relic of barbarism and unworthy of the twentieth century," Dr. Blight said.

LAND GRANT CASE COMING TO END

DECISION IN OREGON & CALIFORNIA RAILROAD CASE WILL BE DECIDED BY FEDERAL JUDGE WITH BUT LITTLE DELAY

The end of the long drawn out Oregon & California Railroad company's land grant suit, involving considerable land in this section, is drawing near. It is expected that the case will be completed by September 2d, so far as the government is concerned, and that the defense will be through by September 15th.

In deciding the case this time Judge Wolverton will not require the time for research and study taken when the issue came before him on demurrer, as it is understood that the law is settled already, and the judge will merely be called upon to determine the questions of fact, which are in a degree a matter of record.

FAMOUS CASE IS OUT OF COURTS

NEWS OF DECISION OF THE FEDERAL COURT IN CASE OF DANIELS VS. MESEKOVY IS RECEIVED IN THE CITY

A copy of the decree from the federal court dismissing the case of A. D. Daniels vs. Mason C. Meservy was received at the court house here Tuesday, and thus ends litigation over land in 27-10, which has been before the courts and the land office officials for years.

The court sustained the demurrer and dismissed the amended complaint. The land involved was originally taken up by scrip, but later this was discovered to be without proper base, and Northern Pacific scrip was applied. In the meantime the land was taken up by homesteaders, and in the subsequent litigation they have all been successful.

SHOW FOLKS RODE ROUTE BY WAGON

Frederick Moore, Dozen Years Since, Organized Company Here and Started Out in Specially Constructed Vehicle, Built by Alva Beale

Frederick Moore, the actor, whose starring partner, professionally known as Pearl Ethier, is in private life Mrs. Moore, is one of the pioneer actors of Central Oregon.

About a dozen years ago, it was related this morning by Manager John Houston, of the Klamath Falls opera house, Mr. Moore was here and organized a company to tour some of the coast territory adjacent to this city. The plan was to travel the interior route by wagon, and all the Theatians engaged were apprised in advance of the conditions regarding transportation.

Mr. Moore at that time had built in Klamath Falls a wagon especially designed for the transportation of the troupe. The vehicle was a 12-passenger affair, and drawn by four horses. It was constructed by Alva Beale, a local wagon maker, who some time since left the city.

The scenery and baggage of the company were carried in another wagon, a two-horse one, and thus equipped the company started out through the sage brush, playing what was then known as the "coyote" circuit. They played at Lakeview, Cedarville, Susanville, Alturas and other towns in the Modoc circuit, taking in the west coast through Trinity county. Also Scott's Valley and back to this city.

For four years the company toured the towns which are not available by railroad, in the provincial style indicated, and the project was successful from the start.

The Moore-Ethier company, which played here last week, is still in the city, but will leave the latter part of the week, playing Bonanza and Bly Saturday and Sunday nights.

Most Indians are very fond of color and circuses. They can have the color all the time, but the circus they have an opportunity to see but once in a coon's age, more or less, depending on the age of the coon as well as on the supply of circuses.

So all sorts and conditions of Indians may be looked for to visit this city tomorrow, and they will be much in evidence on Main street and at the circus grounds. Many of them will come with their wagons and camping equipment, and feel as much at home during their informal stay as though they were in their regular domiciles.
