

FAIR PROSPECTS MAKE GLADNESS

FARMERS AND TRUCK GARDENERS RELATED OVER FACT THAT AGRICULTURAL DISPLAY WILL NOT BE LACKING THIS YEAR

Farmers hereabouts are tickled at the promise of a county fair this year, and the truck gardeners are also "feeling their oats" at the prospect of a fine layout of vegetables to be offered for public inspection, admiration and coveting.

Some people were afraid that there was to be no county fair this year, for B. St. George Bishop, who was the Pooh-Bah of the institution last season had given it out that he would not manage the fair this season. This made it seem as though the display of cattle and soil products might be lacking at the fair grounds in 1912.

The fair boosters regard it as especially desirable that there be a fair this year for the reason that the season is favorable to practically all fruits, vegetables and grains. There has been much more rain this year than last, and the truck gardeners are having better success, both in quality and variety of what they raise than heretofore, as reported in this paper yesterday.

Efforts will be made this year to avoid a repetition of the losses caused last year by people entering the fair without paying admission. At that time the grounds were insufficiently fenced or patrolled, and while a count of the grand stand, especially on the principal day, showed a crowd big enough to make a well-filled till, the tally of people and the tally of money were so far apart that the management got busy to figure the discrepancy. The result was that General Manager Bishop ascribed to non-paying attendants a loss of something in the neighborhood of \$1,000.

The fair this year will be managed by Caleb T. Oltver, secretary of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce. The dates will be September 25, 26, 27 and 28, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

CIRCUS ARRIVES HERE AT 4:15

BUT FEW PEOPLE WITNESSED THE ARRIVAL BECAUSE OF THE EARLY HOUR—UNLOADING COMMENCED AT ONCE

Because of the early hour of arrival, but few people witnessed one of the best parts of circus day, the unloading of the stock and paraphernalia, and this part is free, too.

The Kit Carson Buffalo Ranch Wild West show arrived in the city at 4:15 this morning, and unloading was started at once, so that everything was in readiness for the big show this afternoon long before the time of the parade.

The circus train of 17 cars came here directly from Montague, where a performance was given last night.

LOCAL FOLKS GOING TO LAKEVIEW FOR PURPOSE OF BOOMING CENTRAL OREGON WILL BE SOMEWHAT NUMEROUS

On Monday next the boosters from Klamath Falls and vicinity who will attend the Lakeview meeting of the Central Oregon Development League will leave this city for the scene of the convention, which is scheduled for August 20, 21 and 22.

Worden with his two machines filled with uplifters; J. E. Pelton and Dan Ryan, with two machines from Fort Klamath; County Commissioner Guy Merrill, with a party of Merrittites; E. B. Hall of the Hotel Hall; C. M. O'Neill, the attorney, and W. Paul Johnson, of the Klamath Development company, with his automobile.

The party will probably leave at a fairly early hour in the morning, and arrive in Lakeview in time for supper, the distance being about 100 miles. The majority of the representatives from over the state will, in all probability, arrive at Lakeview about the same time, so that there will be many handshakings and friendly pow-wows preliminary to the business sessions, which are to begin on the morning following.

One of the purposes of the local delegation, but the least important, is to escort the Portland visitors to this city at the adjournment of the meeting.
