SEASON IS SLOW, SAYS MARKWARDT

Mills Addition Vegetable Man's Ex-
perience Does Not Put 1912 Ahead
of Past Seasons—Has Raspberries
This Year

F. C. Markwardt, the Mills addition
gardener, who holds forth at Darrow
and Washburn way, was in this morn-
ing with a wagon load of cauliflower,
asparagus, cabbage, onions, lettuce,
beets, radishes and cucumbers, among
other vegetables. His experience is
that this season has been rather back-
ward, and not as good as usual for
his line.

"The season has been short this
year, the weather not favoring us as
well as in the past, according to my
observation," said he. "There was
for instance, frost last night. It was
not just at my place, but in the flats
below Mills addition and in a part of
the addition there was a white sur-
face this morning. My place is a
little better favored with protection
than some others."

"This soil and climate is a good one
for roots, and all of them will grow
fine. The climate is just like it was
when I first went to Colorado. That
was in 1882, and at that time they
said that the location was not good
for fruits, but the climate there has
altered considerably since that time,
and it has developed as a fruit
country."

"My work there was with irriga-
tion, as it is in Mills addition. I ex-
pect to have raspberries this season
for the first time. I'm the only man
who has raised raspberries hereabouts.
Cucumbers and summer squash will
be a part of this year's growing, too.
I had one cabbage this morning that
weighed 15 pounds and such a weight
is not infrequent for that vegetable."

Mr. Markwardt, when he went to
Denver, Colo., in 1882, purchased 20
acres of land at \$15 per acre, selling
the property about two years later.
In those days the Queen City was a
very small burg, and all the street car
facilities consisted of three horse
cars. But in 28 years Denver has ex-
panded enormously, and the place
that Mr. Markwardt got for \$15 per
acre has become Capitol Hill, holding
the state house and some of the most
fashionable and costly buildings and
dwellings in the Centennial state met-
ropolis.

Mr. Markwardt would not object if
he owned the 20 acres now, and
laughed heartily this morning as he
said so.

REGULARS PROD UP LAFFERTY

OREGON CONGRESSMAN IS ASKED
TO STATE WHERE HE STANDS
WITH RESPECT TO THE REGU-
LAR REPUBLICAN PARTY

PORTLAND, Aug. 16.—Congress-
man A. W. Lafferty was sent a tele-
gram asking him to state whether he
stands for Taft or Roosevelt. The
wire was dispatched by the repub-
lican congressional committee at the
request of the county central com-
mittee. P. T. Fisher, member of the
congressional committee, declared to
the meeting that if he was Lafferty he
would not reply to such a wire. Then
Fisher sputtered out. After his de-
parture, County Chairman Wright ex-
plained that Fisher is a Bull Moose,
and wanted to have the full commit-
tee pass resolutions censuring the
Chicago delegates who voted for Root
for chairman of the convention. At
the next meeting of the committee it
is expected that word will have been
received from Dan Kelleher as to
where he stands respecting the re-
publican party.

SENATORS CUT BUT LITTLE ICE

DEPARTMENT HEADS NO LONGER
DANCE TO THE BIDDING OF
THE REPRESENTATIVES OF
THE DIFFERENT STATES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—
"Officers of the government depart-
ments stand in less fear of congress-
men and senators than they used to,"
observed the private secretary of a
cabinet officer lately.

"It was not so long ago that a con-
gressman coming into a department
and approaching a chief of a bureau
looked like an awful big man. Lots
of times he didn't need to come at
all to get what he wanted. He'd just
sit at the telephone in his office and
call up the head of the bureau. When
the government employee found out
that a congressman was at the other
end of the wire there would be a
great commotion. The chief and his
assistants would work themselves
into a paroxysm of energy to get the
statesman anything he wanted. If
he wanted a star route established
by the postoffice department, he got
it. If he wanted a constituent trans-
ferred, he got it. If it was impossible
to accede to his demands profuse
apologies and promises were offered
in lieu thereof.

"But now it's different. If a con-
gressman wants something he puts
his application in in the regular
order. Nobody tears the office upside
down if he approaches. He waits
just as long for an interview as any-
one else, gets the same treatment,
and no distinction is made. Govern-
ment clerks have got wise to the fact
that a congressman is not such a gi-
gantic proposition after all."

WOMEN WALK A LONG DISTANCE

PARTY OF FOUR, INCLUDING TWO
SCHOOL TEACHERS, AVERAGE
14 MILES A DAY ON A TRIP TO
CRATER NATIONAL PARK

A party of four, including two wo-
men, has just completed a 200-mile
hiking trip to Crater Lake from Eu-
gene.

The party consisted of D. J. H. Gil-
bert, professor of economics at the
University of Oregon; Mrs. Gilbert,
C. N. Reynolds of the registrar's of-
fice, and Miss Cora Shaver, a teacher
in the Portland schools. The party
stopped en route home from the lake
at Lake of the Woods, and met there
a number of Klamath Falls people.

The trip to Crater Lake was made
over the government trail, along the
north fork of the Umpqua. The re-
turn was made over the Dead Indian
road by way of Pelican Bay and the
Lake of the Woods. The trip occupied
11 days, the party averaging 14
miles a day. The longest march was
from Camp Arant to Fort Klamath,
17 miles. The gentlemen of the party
carried about 40 pounds each, the
equipment consisting of sleeping
bags, blankets and necessary provi-
sions. They report campers numer-
ously along the Dead Indian road, par-
ticularly at Lake of the Woods and
Lost Prairie.

SMALL FOREST FIRE IS RAGING

REPORT REACHES HERE THAT
CONFLAGRATION STARTS IN
CRATER FOREST RESERVE.
NOTHING SERIOUS EXPECTED

According to reports received here
a small forest fire is raging at the
head of Star Gulch, in the Crater forest
reserve. It is expected, however,
that it will soon be under control, as
a number of men are on the scene.
There have been slight showers
throughout the forest recently, and
this has lessened the danger greatly
from damage by fire.

Owing to the absence on his vaca-
tion of Rev. J. S. Stubbinsfield, pastor
of the First Presbyterian church,
there will be no preaching there next
Sunday. There will, however, be
Sunday school as usual.

BULLET PROOF CLOTH IS MADE

GOVERNMENT WILL ADOPT NEW
MATERIAL FOR UNIFORMS OF
CORPS OF AVIATION—ITALIAN
BIRD MAN IS WOUNDED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—
Uniforms of bullet proof cloth, such
as has recently been invented in
Japan, will probably be prescribed
by the army authorities for the corps
of aviation, it is learned at the war
department. The circumstance which
will bring about this order was the
recent wounding of an Italian flying
scout, who was struck high in air by
an Arab bullet while over Tripoli.

Captain Monte is the name of the
Italian officer who thus gained the
distinction of being the first aviator
to be wounded by a rifle bullet. He
was badly wounded, but gripped the
control of his senses, and piloted his
fragile monoplane back to his own
camp, landing safely, and delivering
information of the enemy which he
had gained on his flight. His ma-
chine was hit four times by the en-
emy's "duck hunters."

Captain Monte also succeeded in
dropping some damaging bombs in
the Arab's ranks.
